The average voter of better education and intelligence takes no thought of the hereafter and is even more indifferent to the hereafter. He is completely engrossed by the present. That which Bacon calls "the wisdom of our ancestors" makes a little appeal to his reverence or reason as that which Burns calls "light from heaven" makes sweep to his imagination. He would not change the current crop reports with a rising price list for all the books that were written on political economy. He either carries the fool of vicinage with him or else raises rough dust to blind his eyes and disarm his suffrage. They were deaf alike to precedents, to reason and to eloquence; for nothing could surpass as nothing has ever equalled the personal canvass of Mr. Bryan. He swept through a world of inanimate evil bearing the cross of Jesus to triumph with greater force of inspiration and truth than did the heroic son of Nebraska traverse a land gaping with curiosity, not too busy over its work and play to consider any danger to the immortal soul of its constitutional fabric.

"There is something yet better than being president of the United States and that is the real sense of duty done. Tilden will live in history when Hayes is forgotten or execrated. CROWDS GREET CAR.

The Southern Pacific Demonstration train in charge of a corps of scientific educators on farm subject from the state agricultural college, made a triumphant tour of Polk county last Friday. At each place the school children were given a half holiday and they turned out en masse to help in the sightseeing. A constant stream of people passed through the cars looking at the fine exhibits of different products, and learning how the fine showing was arranged at.

The car devoted to agriculture contained a fine display arranged by the agricultural college and information was furnished by Prof. H. D. Schuller. A feature of the horticultural display was an exhibit of frames containing samples showing the result of infection by all insect pests known to this section. Broodths that were infested with showing the improvement in the fruit after each year's spraying. The specimens ranged from the small, wormy fruit of the first year to the final perfect specimen. A demonstration of improved methods of packing fruit was made at the side of the train and was the center of an interested crowd of spectators.

A center of interest was the stock car, in which were three cows of the experimental station at Corvallis. Here a demonstration of milking machines was given. Power to the milking machine was furnished by a gasoline engine, but machines were shown which may be operated by foot power.

Dr. Wilbycomb, secretary in part of the purpose of the train: "We want little farms and many of them. We want a family on each of the farms, each farm working according to the methods which will give him the greatest returns from the soil owned by him. This is the aim of the present, and contentment. This will mean the making of Oregon, or the Willamette valley." In the Willamette valley, there are approximately 500,000 acres of tillable land," he said. "Only a dent has been made in this vast acreage with the present population and the present methods of cultivation. Every acre of land in the Willamette valley included in this vast reach of 45,000,000 acres is capable of returning an annual income of \$100. Every 20 acres is capable of supporting a family, not in comfort alone but in luxury."

Initial steps to defeat the election of Governor Chamberlain as United States senator by the legislature next winter have been taken by the Sellwood Republican Club. This organization has appointed a committee that is instructed to circulate petitions among the voters relieving the republican legislators-elect of Multnomah county, who subscribed to Statement No. 1, from discharging their obligation. Before many weeks elapse similar petitions will probably be circulated in various other counties of the state from which republican members of the legislature were elected as statement men.—Oregonian.

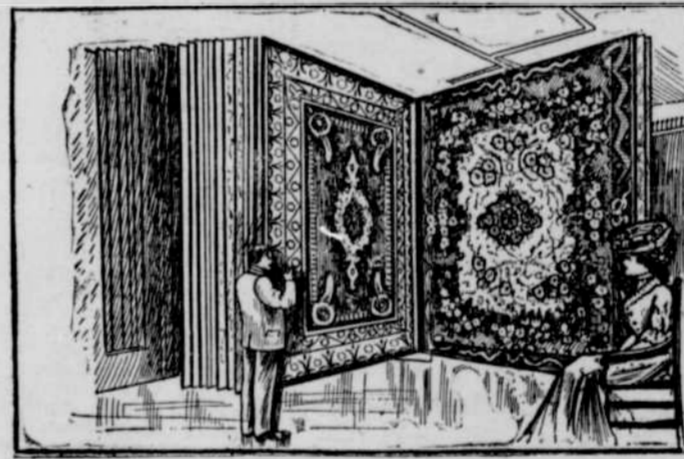
