### COUNCIL MEETING.

Water Works Question Takes up a Whole Lot of Time.

The city council met in regular session last Monday evening with all the officials present except Councilman Shaw. Mayor Muir was on motion made a committee of one to see that a ditch is dug for the draining of the pit at the quarry. The dangerous condition of the street at the foot of Washington, where the culvert is, was brought up by Councilman Uglow, and on his motion a 20-power light was ordered placed there to enable those driving to see where to go. A petition to have the Cooper Hollow road leading out of town given the name of Uglow street and made a width of 70 feet was presented. On motion of Councilman Ellis an ordinance was ordered drawn up to that effect.

The members of the council and visitors frequently availed themselves of the water supply so kindly introduced into the council chamber at the expense of Alderman Uglow. Sidewalk ordinances were up for both first and second reading.

Councilman Uglow here placed himself on record in an emphatic speech against the construction of any more sewers unless within the city limits, and fully explained why the cement ones were the cheapest in the long run. The members of the body gave his remarks undivided attention, and it is to be hoped that his advice will be followed and an ordinance to that effect drawn up in the near future.

Now appeared H. V. Gates and asked permission to address the council on matters relative to the water works. He stated that during the irrigation season owing to the wastefulness in its use, the present supply was insufficient to admit of such and at the same time safeguard the city against fire. Mr. Gates said there was two remedies for such a state of things, either to put meters on the irrigation supply or to go farther up in the mountains about one-half mile to Applegate creek and get more water, which would necessitate another reservoir or two for its storage. The building of an additional reservoir, he stated, would be a necessity in the immediate future anyway, and he urged upon the council that they at once purchase more ground, and if done, he would construct the reservoir next summer. The capacity of the present reservoir he stated to be 232,000 gallons. During the summer this goes to 158 homes in Dallas for the watering of lawns, and the full capacity of the reservoir was used up, leaving nothing for an emergency. He supplies 294 residences besides the business houses. The water is continually being wasted in every way, as for instance the allowing of a stream of water to run on a lawn in one place for several hours. Such does the ground no good. A few minutes in each place is better for the grass and the ground.
