TEAM STARTS ON LONG TOUR.

Dallas Basketball Team Will Travel 10,000 Miles.

The Oregon basketball team of Dallas, Oregon, played its first road game of a long tour, which includes a visit to Buffalo, New York, last night defeating the boys across the Columbia by the overwhelming score of 43 to 6. The Dallas players comprise a number of the best players developed in that hustling little town and last night they commenced a series of games that will require three months to complete, during which time they will travel nearly 10,000 miles. The tour of the team is being backed by the business men of Dallas, who subscribed a sum of money to start the team on its long tour, which is undertaken principally to advertise the state. H. L. Fenton, a business man of Polk county, is accompanying the team in the capacity of business manager. Mr. Fenton is a brother of the Portland Pentons and is accompanied by his wife and son, the latter being a member of the team. The other players on the Oregon team are: Captain Edward Shaw, N. Reid, A. Morton, G. C. Shaw, T. Savory, L. Rice and B. A. Teats, team manager. Through a mistake it was mentioned that this team was defeated by the Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club five last Saturday. Multnomah played and defeated the Dallas College team instead.—Oregonian.
