THE COUNCIL MEETS.

The Tax Levy Placed at 10 Mills all Told.

The city council met in regular session last Monday evening with all present on roll except Councilman Shaw.

A proposition from Jas. Boydston regarding an additional reservoir site was verbally presented by Councilman Ellis, and referred to the fire and water committee for further investigation.
Mrs. George Gerlinger, librarian of the free library, appeared before the council, and in a very nice talk spoke of the work carried on by the library since its institution, the benefit it had proven to those in search of knowledge, and made a plea for a special levy of 1/2 mill to carry on the work next year. Mrs. Gerlinger cited the state law on the subject, and explained their methods of operations. She said ours was the first library put in after the passage of that law, and that as such we were looked to as an example of what could be done in that line. The library is under control of a board of six appointed by the mayor, who elect their own officers and have entire charge of its finances. The term of the old board is now about to expire, and Mayor Mair will the first of the year appoint a new. That Mrs. Gerlinger's remarks were effective, will be seen by the tax levy.
On motion of Councilman Ellis the auditor was instructed to notify the S. P. to build a sidewalk on their right of way on the North Dallas hill.
On motion of Councilman Mair the auditor was instructed to build 3-board crosswalks on the streets at Hanson's and Lee's in North Dallas.

Resolutions were introduced and passed for the general and special tax levies of the Dallas for 1909 as follows:
General tax.....1.7-10 mills
Water tax.....1.7-10 mills
Library tax.....1/2 mill

Considerable time was taken up in the discussion of the city's financial situation, all the council being in favor of making the tax as low as possible and meet their obligations.
Ordinances making all curbs of cement and providing for a different way of laying board sidewalks were introduced and read first time.
Considerable time was also taken up in the making up of the assessment for the sewer work, and it was 11 o'clock before a motion to adjourn could be made.
