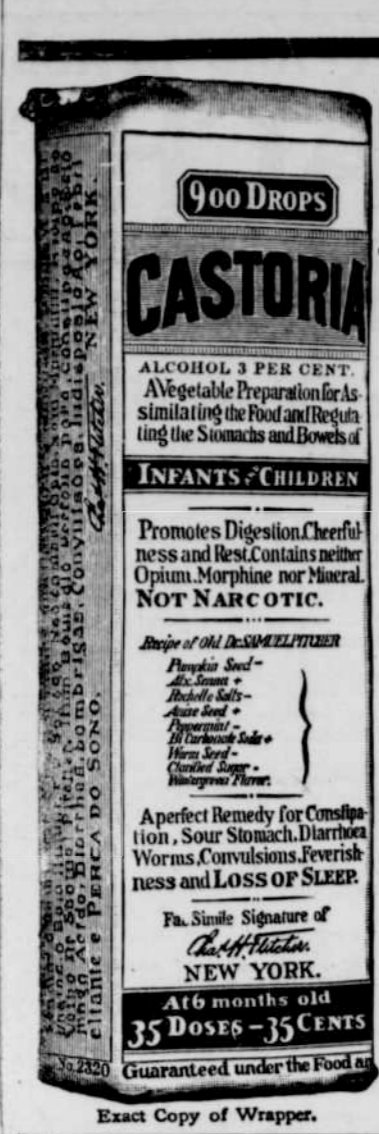

HOW MONEY WAS SAVED To Taxpayers by Our Far Seeing City Councilmen.

After the installation of our rock crusher last spring it was thought by many that the cheapest way of getting our macadam road work done and the quarry opened up in good shape would be to let the job to some experienced contractor, such as the Portland man who came up and put in a bid for the work, laboring under the opinion that this was the cheapest and best way out of it, and that the mayor and councilmen could not afford to take the time to look after all the numerous details and see that thorough work was done.

The council were able to do this work in good shape, firstly because they were lucky in securing the services of good and capable men to look after both ends of the work; secondly because Mayor Muir down they devoted much of their own time to looking after the details and continually eliminating every item of unnecessary expense. They gave freely of their time to this end, without one cent of recompense, bore with the kicks of disgruntled taxpayers, and endeavored to faithfully perform the duties entrusted to them, simply because as a body they were working for the welfare of their home town, and wanted to leave a record behind them of which anyone might well be proud. And they have surely done so. Today the nine blocks completed stand as a monument to their sagacity. Every citizen points to them with pride, and every stranger comments favorably on their appearance.

The city now owns a rock crusher that cost us \$1300, and which could be duplicated today for \$1700. It is just as good as new, if not better. We have a good roller worth \$1700. We have 2 1/2 acres of the best rock in the country for making roads that cost us \$80, but which since it is opened up is well worth \$14,000. In fact we have made a record as to street work unequalled in Oregon. This is shown by the fact that Dallas is pointed to as an example by the manufacturers of the rock crusher, and men have come here from as far as Yakima, Wash., to learn of our methods. This more and even better work will be done next year is certain, the only drawback to the amount to be doing the funds at the command of the city.
