Representative Hawley today introduced a bill authorizing the sale of all water power sites on reserved lands. The government farm there is to be cut up into 5-acre tracts and 40 acres of this farm nearest the government building is to be laid off as a townsite and sold, reserving to actual business men and residents the right to buy the land upon which their respective buildings stand.

Where such lands are sold to others than the real owners of buildings thereon, the owner shall have the right to sell his improvement to the purchaser of the land or remove his improvements. The net proceeds of the sale of these lands is to be paid in part to the Siletz Indians and part is to be spent in erecting schools for their children.

THAT ALLIANCE GAME.

Canton, Ohio, Feb. 1, 1902. Editor Itemizer:

By your kind permission I would like to tell the people of the basketball games which I saw played by the Oregonians in our part of the state. They played at Mansfield January 28th and at Ada January 29th, and came from there to Alliance 18 miles from Canton. I went to see the game. This was the first I saw the Oregonians since leaving Dallas. We had a fine visit at the hotel, then went to the rink, where the crowd was gathering, and I saw as soon as the game started that the crowd was in evidence, and there would likely be a time different from what Dallas people would use to find in a basketball game. The referee was called for rules the Oregonians had never played. Then he wanted the referee all through the game. Finally, after much talk and delay they commenced giving Alliance the referee the first half, and the Oregonians the second half and used the "Alliance rules" all through the game. The whistle sounded, and the battle here who was it was not all basketball. The Oregonians played their usual ball as far as the "Alliance rules" would permit. The part that the Alliance team played was "drivable" all over the court, and shot for the basket without passing to another player. They would run with the ball three to five, six or seven steps, or longer if the whistle didn't blow. They were rough in the extreme, the worst I ever saw. The game was on about five minutes, when Flynn, the Oregonian, was fouled by the Alliance player, and the crowd rushed into the court. But the Oregonians were, and by a line held from two policemen, the crowd was kept out of the court, and order was restored. The Oregonians demanded that Flynn be put out of the game, but the Alliance refused, and made all kinds of promises. More words and more delay, and the game was then resumed. The referee was put on splendid work, but he was handicapped with the "new" rules. The first half ended with the score 16 to 10 in favor of Alliance.
