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Patronize One Another for the Upbuilding of Town and County.

CITY ELECTION.

On the first Monday in April the voters of Dallas will be called upon to elect a full corps of city officials, with the exception of three councilmen who hold over from the last election. Candidates for the several positions are numerous, and there will be no trouble in finding those who are perfectly willing to harken unto the voice of the people and sacrifice personal convenience for the lure of office even if there be no emoluments attached. In order to best subserve the public weal, the Itemizer would like to see the entire outgoing list of officials re-elected. By so doing the interests of our town would be best cared for. Our present council has done a grand and good work in the progress of the town's affairs, they have further improvements started for this year, and to them should be given the job of completing the same. We are not informed as to whether any of the gentlemen desire to stand for reelection, but hope that none of them feel averse to continuing the work they have so painstakingly and economically begun. We have been in close enough touch with them during the last two years to know that thousands of dollars have been saved our taxpayers by the economical way in which they have looked after every detail, and the experience in such matters that they were able to give. It has not all been plain sailing, by any means, and mistakes of judgement have occurred, as would under any administration, but taken all in all, no council has made a better record in permanent improvements at as low as possible practical cost. The mayor and every retiring councilman have proved themselves indefatigable workers for the good of the city; day after day have they given of their time to see that work was being done in ship shape, and not one cent of the city's money was being expended wastefully. They have looked after every detail of the city's improvement work with the same forethought and care that they would give to their own business. This has been done without one cent of personal revenue in prospect, the only recompense they receiving being the knowledge that they were performing the arduous duties entrusted to them by the citizens of Dallas. They know, and so do all who have full knowledge of their work, that it has been well done. Why, then, under the circumstances of such an unqualified record for good work, should we desire to displace them, and put in men entirely new to the work? We have not one word to say against any of the gentlemen who have been talked of for the several positions, and under any other circumstances would be earnest advocates of their reelection, but at this time we want the old council to continue the work they have so ably begun, and have the city derive the benefit from their rich fund of recently acquired experience along improvement lines. The city's finances demand the old timers still at the wheel. In no other way can you be assured of an economical administration and continued improvement.

COUNCIL MEETING.

Several Petitions for Changes in Macadam Work.

The city council met in regular session last Monday evening with all the officials present, except Councilman Myers, who is serving on the federal grand jury in Portland. Councilman Cook made a verbal report for the street committee and recommended a new walk in front of the Shriver property.

The above bill from Venske & Taylor was for the balance due on the last sewer work, which is now completed. On motion of Cook payment was provided for by the issuance of four interest-bearing warrants, two payable in one year and two in two years, bearing 6 per cent interest.

On motion of Cooper next Monday was set for the council to look over the work done and see that it was according to contract, and it was accepted by the city at their adjourned meeting that evening.

On motion of Cooper, as chairman of the finance committee, a warrant was ordered drawn for \$19.75 to pay interest on a warrant drawn a year ago for \$9,000, and the same was ordered taken up. A warrant of \$800 was also ordered drawn on the general fund and credited on an interest-bearing warrant of \$1,500.

A petition from the macadamization of Washington street, signed by many property owners, was read and ordered placed on file.

A petition from F. H. Manston and others regarding the vacating of the south end of Main street was read and referred to the street committee.

A petition from property owners was read requesting that the last block on Levens street be not macadamized was read and the prayer granted.

A communication from the Dallas Protective association requesting the payment of our fire ladders as given in last week's Itemizer, was read and laid over.

The council then sat to hear objections to the proposed macadam street improvements. Hon. N. L. Butler was the only one appearing, and he wanted Oak street cut down to a 40 foot roadway.

The hearing was then closed, the resolution passed and the ordinance read first time.

A petition to vacate the south end of Main street was read first time.

The second reading of the near beer ordinance was postponed.

Quite a fight came up on the question of the postponing of the pool room ordinance, and the council gave a vote. The mayor voted in the affirmative and the ordinance laid over.

An ordinance providing an appraising the manner of laying macadam was read and passed.

The plumbing ordinance was again laid over, owing to the lateness of the hour when it was reached.

A ROYAL WELCOME.

Town Goes Mad With Delight at Oregon's Home Coming.

Coming in on the train Friday night we were surprised to hear that Casey keep his whistle going as though the town were afire. Soon other whistles from various manufacturing plants joined in until the whole air was a vibrating mass of unearthly sound, such as had never before been heard in our usually decorous little city. Getting closer to the depot we found the sky alight with red fire, and at last managed to distinguish the strains of our band vainly endeavoring to make themselves heard above the other noises. Ye editor did not for an instant allow himself to think that all this racket was an expression of the joy of our people at his safe arrival from the metropolis over our first class roadbed, but knew instantly that Dallas was out to welcome her boys—the victorious Oregonians, after their three months trip all over the United States. They surely did the welcome act up brown. The boys were escorted down town by our entire population, and after the band had played a few pieces, the crowd broke up in groups with one of the team as a central figure, and listened to their experiences. It was three months today from the time the boys started until their return, and during that time they travelled just about 10,000 miles, visited just 22 different states, and rode on many different kinds of railway. They enjoyed the best of health on the entire trip, owing greatly in part to the rigorous training they imposed on themselves, being particularly obstinacious in all lines of both eat and drink. This, together with their youth and admirable physical physique, acted as a first class safeguard against ill health.
