COAL PROSPECTS.

Old Polk About to Divulge Another of Her Underground Secrets.

The operations here noted are located in Polk county about five miles west of this city on land owned by Charles Clark and a Mr. Homeyer. Both prospects lie in the same range of hills skirting a small spring branch flowing in an easterly direction about one mile as the crow flies west and a trifle south of the Wallace fruit farm.

At the Clark prospect a shaft of the regulation coal nine dimensions enters the hill from the north some ten or fifteen feet above the bed of the creek. The tunneling is in almost solid rock and already extends eighty feet or more into the side of the hill.

The prospect of the Homeyer place, being worked by a practical coalminer, J. W. McDowell, under lease is older than the Clark tunnel, and operations are going forward daily. The latter prospect has been worked at intervals for some time, but of late the operation have been more insistent in keeping with the growing enthusiasm of the manager and interest of the community. These mining operations began about a year ago when searchers for well water found also prospects of gold, coal and other minerals.

When the attention of Mr. McDowell was directed to the signs of coal he secured a lease from Mr. Homeyer providing for certain mining privileges on the latter's land, and since then has devoted all the time and resources possible to development work. Mr. Clark evidently caught the inspiration of McDowell.

While the operations so far have been competitive in nature and have brought forth sneers and jibes from those of little faith in the community, men of mature judgment are inclined to give credence to McDowell's sincerity from the fact that he is a practical mining man, and it may yet develop that he will have the last and best laugh in the day when coal in paying quantities is discovered.—Salem Statesman.
