All kept well and enjoyed the splendid scenery, especially over the Denver and Rio Grande road. There has been marked improvements all through the west and middle states, but that which gives signs of greatest thrift and material wealth of any place through which we passed in central Kansas. That is certainly as fine a country as God has spread out doors. That which impressed me most coming into Kansas, was the absence of the saloon and its effects on society. Prohibition does prohibit. You can tell the boys that those 400 empty buildings in K. C. K. that they talked so much about in June have all been rented now. Ha! ha! Well, we are nicely located in our new home in Altoona in the south east part of the state. We have a fine home the nicest parsonage we have ever had. We live in the gas belt and our heat, cooking, light and all is by gas. I tell you it is fine. There is no dirt, no ashes or soot, and a man will almost quarrel with his wife to get to start the fire in the morning, and then it is so cheap. It costs me \$1.90 a month for two fires and six lights. Well, now as to our town: We have perhaps a few more people than Dallas, have quite a large pay roll. From our brick plants, glass factories, cement plants, planer, etc. I get \$1,000 cash salary here and parsonage beside. We like it fine, have had fine weather ever since we got back. I don't have asthma here at all, so you see that makes me feel good. We have no kick against Oregon, nor Dallas. Give our kindest regards to the friends and tell them I should like to be one hand at the city election, for I enjoy a little politics once in a while. I will not take more of your time. CENTRAL ENERGY.

This New System now in Vague on Home Telephone.

Mr. J. M. Staats was in town Monday to see how his new central energy system of telephoning worked out between here and Independence on the new commercial wire lately installed between the two places. He has this system in use in Independence, and found that it worked as well between the two towns as it did in Independence. This is the longest line of the kind in existence in Oregon, it being 12 1/2 miles long, and the next longest being at Hood River of 8 miles. The system in general use here is the magnets, but in time this will be entirely superseded by the central energy. Central energy means the furnishing of the electric power from the central station, instead of being given from batteries from each individual phone. All necessary to call central is to take down your receiver, and then give the number you desire to talk with. Mr. Staats stands ready to connect up all former phones on this system who desire to take advantage of its utility. If you want such an improvement, make application to him. Mr. Staats is the owner of the Independent Telephone company of Independence and Airle, and is known as the pioneer in such work in this section. He was the first to establish lines at Albany, Corvallis, Independence, Falls City, and Airle, and now has in operation four lines from Independence to Dallas.

SUNDAY CLOSING.

Council Closes Near Beer Saloons on Lord's Day.

At the regular meeting of the council last Monday evening, all officers were present except Councilman Shaw and Coad.
The marshal was instructed to build a cross walk on the street in North Dallas recently dedicated to the city by M. M. Ellis and W. C. Brown.
An hour was taken up in listening to the city attorney's report relative to half a dozen kick from property owners about the late sewer assessment.

On motion of Cosper a warrant was ordered drawn on the general fund in favor of the sewer fund to pay the sewer assessment of Messrs. Yoakum, McCallon, Williams and Uglov for \$264.20, this being the amount allowed them for right of way for sewer outlets.

Cosper also moved that a warrant be drawn for \$12.18 interest on a rock crusher warrant for \$312, and also one to take up the original warrant.
The resignation of L. D. Brown as city auditor was read and accepted, the same to take effect on April 8th.
Hearing on the Shriver sidewalk was closed, resolution passed and ordinance read first time.
An ordinance providing for the closing of near beer saloons on Sunday and the prohibiting of games for stakes or anything of value was read second time and passed, Uglov voting no. The penalty was fixed at between \$5 and \$25 for each offence. Before the passage of the ordinance, City Attorney Hayter advised the council that in his opinion such a law would be found inoperative, as the charter does not provide that the city can regulate any lawful business, or its hours of closing, although it is in their power to tax the same.

An ordinance was also passed prohibiting minors in pool or billiard halls and closing them up on Sundays. Those can be closed on Sunday, as the charter especially provides for their regulation.
The street macadam ordinance was read second time and passed.

The hour being now nearly 11 o'clock, the council adjourned to Wednesday night, when the appointment of a police judge to succeed Judge Brown is to be considered, also other matters.

THE CITY ELECTION.

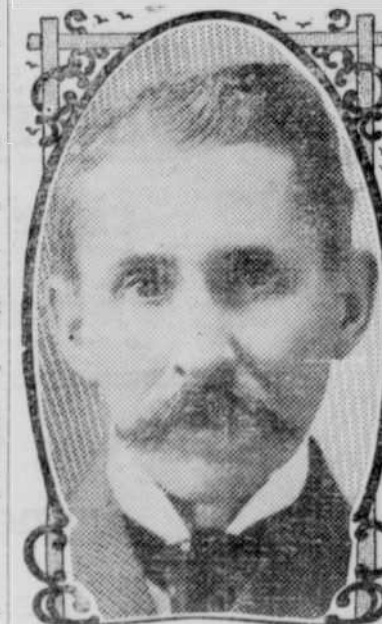
New Men for Mayor and Auditor Elected.
