SUNDAY'S GAME.

Dallas Meets Portland Maroons and Skins Them to a Finish.

Again, our home boys "met the enemy, and they were ours." Dallas 5; Portland Maroons 0. The day was an ideal one, and the largest crowd that has so far attended the games on the home park witnessed this game. The excursion train run from Black Rock and Falls City, brought down about one hundred baseball enthusiasts. No one was disappointed in the game they saw. After the first two innings it was a battle royal to keep the score down, and Portland was unable at any time to get nearer home-plate than second base. Bowen, the Dallas twirler, pitched a great game. Fourteen strike outs was his part in the matinee. The playing of all the Dallas boys, showed great improvement over previous games, particularly their batting.

In the first inning Yett, for the Maroons, faced Bowen first at the bat. He hit safely for one base, and then stole second. But that was all, Bowen got down to business, and the next three men that faced him went out, to being strike outs and one an easy assist from Bowen to 1st base.

In their half of this inning, Dallas proceeded at once to cinch things, and dispel all fears as to the final outcome of the game. Hunt, the first man up for Dallas, went out easily, pitcher to first base. Boydson hit safe for one base, advanced to second on Fenton's hit over second base, and came home on Shorey's bingle to the shortstop who muffed the ball, and then on recoving, over three first base. Fenton and Shorey scored on Tooz's hit to right field. Tooz scoring on the catcher's error. W. Barham and Sheridan then went out on easy chances, and the inning was over. Score, Dallas 4; Portland 0.

In the second inning, Mullen, for Portland, was the first man up and hit safely for two bases, but there he remained. The next three men up went out easily.

In this inning Bowen struck out, Hunt walked, stole second, and then scored on Boydson's hit to right field. The next two men up went out on easy chances. Score, Dallas 5; Portland, 0.

This ended the scoring for the game. Portland never got within striking distance of home plate, while Dallas came near scoring several times. Portland couldn't score the runles tossed at them by Bowen, while Dallas found Winterbotham almost at will. But after the second in-

ing, the game was great from a spectator's standpoint. Dallas supporters wanted a shutout, and Portland wanted to avoid one. The game was free from "rag-chewing." Both teams accepting the decisions of the umpire without comment.

For Dallas, the work of Hunt, Bowen, Shorey and Fenton was specially noteworthy. There is no doubt but that Dallas has an excellent in-field, and the out-field isn't so slow. It is a well balanced team.

HAVE ARRIVED.

The Contractors Now Here for the County Road Work.

Tuesday the outfit of Wolf Bros. & Bradley came up from Washington county to get ready for the work for which they received the contract on our county roads. There are some half dozen men in the gang and that number of wagons and teams. The wagons are extra large, being 14 feet long, 32 inches high and three feet wide, and are able to haul four yards of crushed rock, as against two yards generally hauled by our local wagons. They went on out yesterday morning to the county crusher, now established on Warren Frink's place about three miles out of Falls City, and will get rigging in shape this week, so as to begin active operations at the beginning of next. Their contract with the county calls for some 3,000 yards of road, the same to be about equally divided between the two sections now at the Salt Creek section, it being the aim of the county court this year to get a first class road southwest to Lewisville and Airle, and northwest to Buell and Salt Creek in order to get access to good gravel and not have to depend on the bottom stuff from the small creeks that is of no account after it is put on a road.

It is estimated by Judge Coad that the average cost to the county for the quarrying, crushing and laying of the rock will approximate about \$1.40 a yard or a total cost of some \$4,500 for the contract work. The county has to do the spreading and rolling. It will cost about \$2,500, in round numbers, in addition to get the proposed road up to the proper grade, make the necessary cuts, fills, etc., ready for the laying of the rock. The other precincts will have the usual amount done by the regular roadmasters, the same as occurs every year. The total amount coming out of the road fund this year for all the improvements will probably come up to \$16,000. But it is all needed and more, the only regret of the county court being that they have not twice the amount available for permanent improvement in road work. As it is, Polk county is setting the pace in the right direction, and one which we hope to see followed by every county in the state. Good solid highways make the farmers life a pleasure, and help the town merchant to do more business.

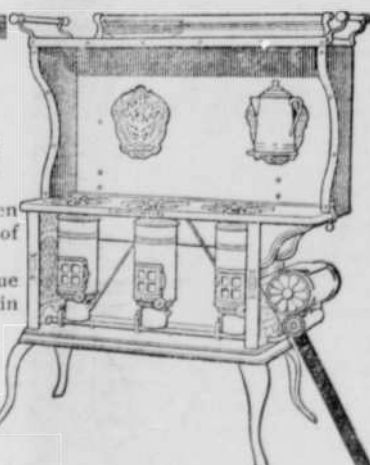
