Rev. and Mrs. Burns will soon move to Alsea.

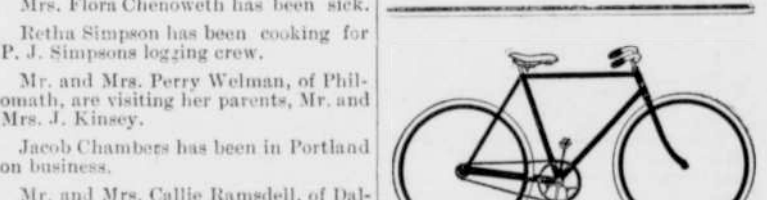
