MAYOR EAKIN'S MESSAGE.
 An Answer from Members of the Former Council.
 To the Honorable City Council of the City of Dallas, Polk County, Oregon:
 In pursuance of section 35 of the City Charter which provides among other things that the Mayor shall annually transmit to the Council a message giving the standing of the City as well as recommendations which may be made to make, I herewith beg to submit the following:
 I would first call your attention to the financial condition of the City as shown by the Treasurer's report, which is made up to this date, and filed herewith. As I am informed we receive for about \$200,000 more than we expend about \$200,000 more than we collect this Fall of about \$170,000. I find by said report that we have on hand at this date in the general fund the sum of \$23,833.33, and in the street fund \$115,587, making a total of all funds available for street improvements and city expenses, of \$139,420.33.
 I further find that we have warrants outstanding to the amount of about \$200,000 making about \$140,000 more than we are permitted under section 85 of our City Charter, which provides in effect that any indebtedness in excess of \$200,000 shall not be a liability of the City, but shall become the personal liability of the members of the Council voting for such indebtedness, and constitute a lien against the property of each of them. This is a very serious matter, and one which should be given the most careful consideration. It is only at such times as the City is making permanent improvements that this apparent indebtedness will occur. The property benefited pays for the improvements and when completed is collected and paid for without any relation to taxes, except for street intersections, and for this year the council has provided for them.
 The Mayor says streets and sewers are needed badly. Not at all. Our streets are fair and compare very favorably with other cities of our size, but civic pride, in keeping with our standing as a progressive city, to make good the advertising we are doing, we must make not only our streets better, but stand for better things generally. We call the attention of the taxpayers at this time to the fact that your council made improvements last year at a cost of more than \$30,000, done the work at home with the labor of our own citizens, and they are all paid for, and I doubt if there is a single citizen in the city that would go back to old conditions. And another fact is positively known—the same was done for many thousands of dollars less in any other way.
 And water supply. The Mayor knows that when the present system and plan was entered into that the city had one of the best attorneys in the state to safeguard its interests, and that during the present year the council have had the matter gone over carefully by an able attorney, also that the council have entered into new arrangements with the water company for water meters and that they are on the ground and will be installed as fast as possible, and that water rates will be reduced.
 Finally, the council are taxpayers, and would be the last men in the city to spend money foolishly, and we are certain that we are supported by a very large majority of the taxpayers and entirely by the business interests. The only two of the old council that stood for re-election, were elected by large majorities, and if the council find that conditions change and the taxpayers or business conditions do not warrant improvements, they will be ready at any time to change their policies.

 At about 11 o'clock the councilmen ceased their labors and adjourned to the regular meeting Monday evening when the bids for city improvement will be acted upon.
