ANOTHER OIL SCHEME.

Another Company Formed to Bore on the Whiteaker Place Near Dallas.

At the meeting last night of the Dallas Protective association there appeared before it a coterie of gentlemen headed by an old Polk county boy, N. M. McDaniel for the purpose of interesting the members of the association individually in the buying of stock in an organization recently formed to go ahead with what is generally known as the Whiteaker oil well. McDaniel first briefly outlined the stock company plans, which are as follows. There is a firm belief in the minds of all experts who have looked the ground over that there is oil to be found in Polk county, and they advance many arguments in favor of this contention. The speaker did not attempt to go into these reasons, leaving that to the geologist to explain, but only touched upon the financial side of the question. This company was recently formed in Portland and incorporated under the name of the Williams Valley Oil and Gas Company, with a capital stock of \$75,000. The following officers: President, N. M. McDaniel; vice president, B. F. Whiteaker; secretary, Will F. Spencer; treasurer, C. S. Shea; director, A. L. Vesile. The object of the company is to bore the oil or gas anywhere in the Williams Valley where they may obtain leases on what they consider productive land. Their starting point is the old Whiteaker well, that being considered to offer better inducements than any other offered at present, and on which a lease has been secured on 720 acres for a year and a half to do the trial drilling. If oil, gas or salt is found in paying quantities, the lease operates for ten years and additional terms of that length as long as the well is in operation, making the lease virtually perpetual as long as the oil holds out. Mr. Whiteaker to receive one tenth of the raw product, whatever it may be. The desire of the company firstly is to secure subscriptions in stock to the amount of \$15,000, which will be sufficient for the purchase of a standard drilling machine, one capable of going into the earth's crust some 3,000 feet. It is never encountered under 2,000 feet and it is perfectly useless in paying operations with the machines heretofore used for the purpose in this vicinity. The drilling machine will cost some \$6,000, and the balance of the amount named would be on hand for the necessary labor, etc. It will take from three to six months to go down the 3,000 feet that they propose to drill, according to the formation encountered. Mr. McDaniel also stated that if it was found in the preliminary drilling that salt was encountered in sufficient quantities to make its distillation a paying commercial venture, a plant would be established at Dallas for this purpose and the water piped to this place, there being fine facilities here for the securing of salt. As early as the year 1858, the salty content of this well was utilized by B. J. Whiteaker, and many tons of salt were manufactured for the use of the old pioneers. The methods then in use were crude, but they got the results just the same. They then got a pound of salt from every two gallons of water, now a pound can be secured from every gallon. If this part of the scheme is found to pay good money to the investor, the present well will be used for that purpose, and another one sunk for oil. It was also stated that a lease had been secured on the lands of Mr. W. W. Fawc, near Crowley, for boring, and the gentlemen here will go to Salem today to sign up the papers. Some \$3,000 of the stock has already been guaranteed, Mr. McDaniel taking \$1,000, Mr. Whiteaker \$500, Mr. Fawc \$500, and others smaller amounts, and a number of additional lands have been offered for lease.

Mr. C. L. Probstel was then introduced. He has for a number of years occupied the position of geologist at the Agricultural college, and his talk was from that standpoint, showing reasons why experts believe this to be an oil bearing section. The professor's talk on this subject was interesting, and we regret lack of space to give it in full. Carefully stated it was the effect that knowing the eruptions of the earth's surface as they do, the different strata as they were formed, etc., they have every indication leading them to believe that this belt is a continuation of things as found in the celebrated Bakersfield district and in the newly found districts in Alaska. Expert geologists believe that the south slope of Mt. Pisgah and the south slope of what is known as Holmes' Gap come nearest to filling the conditions desired of anywhere in the state, and that is why these lands have been leased. A number of questions were asked Mr. Probstel by the members present and much information gained.

Only a preliminary request for stock is now being made by the officers of the company, but Mr. McDaniel will come up again soon and give all a chance to subscribe. The stock sells at \$1 a share, and you can get one share or 100 as you desire, until the 15,000 are taken, when work commences, and the holders take the chances of winning or losing on the proposition. If it wins, there is big money in it for only a small investment; if it loses, the gamble to develop the country has been made and all you can do is to look pleasant.

ANOTHER IMPROVEMENT.

The Dallas Meat Company Installs Ice Factory at Market.

We were called in this morning to look over another improvement that has been added to the up-to-date market of the Dallas Meat company in the Williams brick. We found it to be just about the nearest thing in the way of the proper keeping of fresh meats that we have ever seen. It consists of a full and complete ice factory, which they purchased of the manufacturers in Portland at a cost complete with the trimmings of some \$2,000. It is not their purpose to compete with our ice factory in the matter of ice making, in fact they will not make any at all, although the machine is capable of turning out a couple of tons a day, but will be utilized solely to keep their meats at the proper temperature all the year around. As far as our immediate command of language will allow, we will endeavor to give a description of the way the proprietors are now able to handle their meats. Just back of the meat blocks in the front room are two large bins, 14x16 feet in size. At the rear of the second one is the ice machine, which gets its power from an electric motor. The machine is constantly engaged in compressing gas into air, which is conveyed by pipes to several ice-making tanks. The back room is used for their pickling operations, and they were just taking off some hams that they were hard to beat anywhere. The front room, or bin, is where all their surplus stock is kept, and has four over-runs that will accommodate 10,000 pounds, and as many each of mutton, hogs or veal. Pipes run above so continually frosted with ice as to keep the meat cool above the freezing point, this having been found to be the proper degree of cold to attain the best results. These pipes continue on to the main room where customers are served, and a worn is made in the handsome hardwood 10-foot glass counter where all kinds of neat delicacies are on display, and surely afford a tempting sight to the epicure. Going on to the rear of the room, the collection of the ice-making tanks topped ice bins, where are stored all fish, clams, crabs, and other things of that nature, the temperature in both these places being kept about the same as in the bins. The improvement that most took our eyes for mechanical ingenuity was an overhead rack and scales combined. It runs from the rear of the building to the front, with switches to take the bins on or out in front for cutting up. While we were there Mr. Cass Riggs drove up to the back door with four fine hogs. They were hung on the track without any exertion, rolled along to a certain place on the track where their weight was at once registered on a neat looking pair of scales in the front room. Mr. Gorkie then opened the ice bin, gave them a shove, pulled a couple of switches, and put them just where he wanted them. It that was not handling meat with expediency, we miss our guess. Another neat device we were shown was a saw sharper—surely a handy arrangement. All he did was to put in his meat saw, turn a wheel and the saw came out as nicely sharpened as an expert could do it, and with no eye strain.
