Formation of Phosphate Uncovered on a Polk County Farm.

Every few days some addition is being made to the natural resources of this practically undeveloped country of ours, and there are many other finds yet to be made, more than are even now dreamed of. So far we are only scraping the surface in such development, and the time is coming in the not far distant future when after delving deeper and deeper into the bowels of old mother earth, we will begin to find out what resources we are really provided with. The latest to be discovered is a phosphate mine, located on a farm in this vicinity, and which was yesterday selling at \$40 an acre, but which you could not probably get today for \$300. Thus the world moves, and the man who is alive to the opportunities to be presented in this new country makes the dough. Phosphate is a sort of rock, growing in strata under and sometimes above ground, which when properly treated

ANOTHER INDUSTRY.

Big Tank Arrives for Irrigation of John Castle's Truck Garden and Greenhouse.

Tuesday there arrived in Dallas the large 3,000 gallon water tank that John Castle will utilize for irrigation purposes at his gardens on the island in the creek below the North Dallas bridge across the La Creole. Mr. Castle has there some five acres of the best garden spot that is to be found hereabouts, and he is spending lots of time and money to get it fixed up in the best of shape for all kinds of market gardening and hot-house propagation. The work is being done under the supervision of Tom McPeck, who has had years of experience along such lines, and is thoroughly acquainted with the best and latest means of arriving at the end desired. The output for this season will be confined to what the land can produce without any assistance except that which nature has already so amply provided, such as the raising of tomatoes, cabbages, and the like in large quantities, and for which there is an almost unlimited market. Next year a greenhouse will be in full operation, filled with all kinds of early matured vegeta-
