The boys had with them a 22-rifle for the purpose, and the result of their search was one of those animals. The other boys took this one to the neighbor to dispose of and left the crippled lad in his chair until their return. When they came back, they found him apparently asleep, and on trying to arouse him, found that he had passed away. It was thought for a time that he had succumbed to heart failure, but when R. L. Chapman came to examine the body, he found a tiny hole in the lower part of the abdomen, which he diagnosed as a bullet wound, and on further investigation duplicate marks were found in the clothing. The surmise is that, as he was an extra good shot with the rifle, he probably saw some game, and on reaching for and drawing the gun to him, it was discharged. Both parents were away on the time, and he and a brother were at the home with his grandmother, Mrs. Grant. The mother was notified and arrived last night, and the burial will occur tomorrow in the I. O. O. F. cemetery. The family have the sympathy of all Dallas residents.
