He was a man of strong convictions, and given the ability to express them, made himself a power in the republican party. 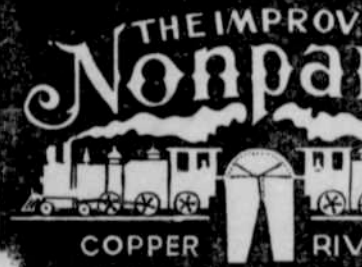

This is decidedly one of the things that might have been put differently.—Westminster Gazette.

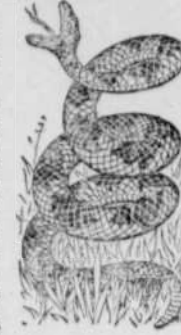
On the Road to Learning.
