DROUTH CONTINUES.

Another Week has Gone by Without Rain.

After rumaging through his records again District Forecaster E. A. Beale made the discovery yesterday that in 1883 Portland was without rain in measurable quantities from June 5th to July 31st, inclusive, covering a period of 57 days. A hasty inspection of his files last week convinced him that the record dry spell was 51 days. Fair weather is the official forecast for tonight and tomorrow. There is little likelihood of a change during the remainder of August. The depth of dust in the roads is increasing every day. In the suburbs the situation is described as "abominable," and mutterings are heard against the weather man on every hand.—Telegram.

Eight more days of dry weather have been added to the record in Polk county since our report of 40 days without rain of last week. This is the longest dry spell on record since 1883, when in the valley it went nearly 70 days without raining, and the smoke from the burning forests was something fierce. We took a vacation in a harvest field in the Waldo hills, and the oppression from this latter source was greatly felt by everyone. All through hay and wheat harvest it lasted, and not until nearly all had their grain hauled to market did a drop of rain fall. It looks now as if we might again have such an end to our summer.

WILL PAY VISIT.

Railroad Commissioners to be at Dallas Friday.

Dispatches yesterday announced that the railroad commissioners would pay Dallas a visit Friday to see about putting in scales here.

Diligent search fails to reveal to the Itemizer any desire for such articles on the part of our shippers. The Southern Pacific is surely not requesting that their company be made to install them, and we understand that the Gerlinger mill is perfectly satisfied with the present way of handling their lumber. There are scales for weighing lumber by carload lots at Portland, Salem and Albany, and as all lumber leaving here, except local consignments, is weighed at one of those places, the request for their installation here must come from some Falls City shipper who imagines he is not getting a fair shake. The rate of figuring a load of lumber in vogue here runs from 2 to 3 1-2 pounds to the foot, according to the quality, and is said to be agreeable to all concerned.

Appropos of the visit of the commissioners here, would it not be well for the Protective association to take up the matter of a new depot with them. That is one of vital interest to every citizen, and one in which something should be done in the near future. The present antiquated excuse for one is altogether out of date, and not at all requisite for the needs of a growing town like Dallas.

The Itemizer is in favor of a union depot, but does not desire that it be located in some out of the way locality. The closer a depot can be put to the business center, the better it is for all concerned.
