A new post office has been established at Bear Camp, on the Salmon River road, about four miles from Leno's forks. Since the Postoffice was discontinued at Pitzer some time ago, that strip of road from Grand Route to Rose Lodge, about 17 miles was left without a postoffice. The settlers along both sides of the road got their mail by star delivery. The new postoffice is called Boyer, and is situated near the center of this 17-mile strip, at the toll gate. Voting Record Hard to Beat.

Two voters cast their ballots at the precinct election Saturday in South Sheridan precinct that have a voting record that possibly cannot be duplicated in the state. The first was "Uncle Billy" Channan who has not missed an election in Sheridan since 1860. His first vote was cast at Amity in 1861. The second was "Uncle George" Graves, who has voted at every election held here since 1857 except two or three when he was a resident of Polk county.
