Reports from traveling men, and they are all pretty foxy about getting next to the public pulse, are to the effect that Eastern Oregon will give a perfect landslide for Oswald West.

Owing to an accident sustained in a runaway last week, Hon. G. W. Myer will not be able to make as thorough a canvass for election to represent Polk and Lincoln in the legislature as he intended, but hopes if his broken ribs are healed to visit Lincoln county next week. All voters of both counties are well aware of the good record made by him in his previous occupancy of the position, and that it would be no mistake to again give him the chance to serve the people loyally and for their best interests.

One of the great troubles with all prohibition argument is that they base too much of it on hearsay, and that is the foremost reason why more convictions are not had when cases of violation come to trial. As an instance we now think of an assertion by one of our local preachers in an address not long ago when he named a town in a certain prohibition state as being absolutely dry. It happened that in his audience was a man who had been in the town mentioned not two weeks before, and who while not a drinking man himself, was a mixer and knew what was going on around him. He assured us that the town named was just the opposite and that instead of liquor being hard to get, it was comparatively easy.

Not so much over two years ago our prohi friends were very busy assuring the voters of Dallas that if they would assist in making the county dry, the buildings occupied by the saloons would soon be filled with other industries, and we might have no fear that our buildings would stand empty and uninhabited. The truth of that assertion has been plainly visible in the last two years, and is today, when those four buildings then occupied by saloons, now stand empty and untenanted. During the two years a number of businesses have made a sort of stagger at occupying them, but all have frozen out, and the one in the Uglow block has been without an occupant nearly all the time, except for a month or two when a billiard and pool hall tried to make a go of it and could not. Oh, yes, going dry has worked wonders in bringing new industries to Dallas.

WEST AND MILEAGE.

Oswald West should wire his thanks to the Oregonian and its evening edition for bringing out the story of the mileage in the Binger Herman case. He is deeply indebted to them for bringing the incident before the public. Instead of harming him the story will be very helpful to the candacy of Mr. West. Briefly stated, the episode is: Mr. West was in Washington, D. C. He had been subpoenaed as a witness in the Herman case. Mr. Heney wired him to return to Portland and testify and he came. He collected mileage to the amount of \$245.25. The interesting part of the episode is that Mr. West, after deducting necessary expenses, turned over to the state of Oregon the balance of the mileage. He accompanied it with a letter to the state treasurer, in which he explained the collection of the mileage, and said the \$215 returned could be applied as required from his own salary. The incident is probably the first case on record in which an official, after collecting an out-of-pocket fee that was personal to himself, has given the amount to the state as refund of salary. The natural course of most men would have been to pocket the money, but it was not so with Mr. West. The more his opponents agitate the incident the more public commendation they will win for Oswald West. Did anybody ever hear of any other official refunding mileage or salary to the state?

Veteran Says Hawley Should Retire.

DALLAS, Or., Oct. 16.—To the Editor of the Journal.—For the information of your many readers and especially the old Indian war veterans of the north Pacific coast, I desire a little space to furnish a few facts relative to our members, and our demands. The figures I give were obtained from the pension agent at San Francisco, and through the courtesy of W. Hosea Wood, a son of our Past Grand Commander Colonel Wood. The statistics are official and perfectly reliable. I would like for every Indian war veteran and widow of every Indian war veteran to cut this out and paste it in their scrap book for future reference. In June, 1910, the number of the veterans of the Indian wars in Oregon was 425; in Washington, 165; in other places on the coast, 100; total 690. Number of widows of veterans, 730, making a grand total of 1420.

We Indian war veterans get \$8 a month, while our widows get \$12. We want our pension laws so amended as to place us on the same footing as the Civil war veterans. We have been urging our claims through our congressmen at every session of our grand encampment. What puzzles us is how did they get as much for the widows and not for the old veterans. We don't envy our widows, God bless their dear old hearts; we want them to get the full benefit of all the increase we demand for ourselves.

Another query comes up in my mind. Why discriminate against us and favor the Civil war veteran? Why, the government treats a Sing Sing convict who is undergoing sentence for murder, better than it does us. The case allude to is that of a former captain in the Civil war. He draws a pension of \$246 a quarter, with \$25 for extras. He gets more for extras than we get for our regular pension.

The question arises will Mr. Hawley be more effective in the past. Cannonism will be dead in the next congress. The tree being dead so will be all the limbs. Dead limbs bear no fruit. These are hints. Nothing succeeds like success; we must judge the future by the past, and the past has proven a dismal failure so far as Mr. Hawley is concerned. I don't want to say anything about Mr. Ellis as he was retired by his own party at the primaries. As a matter of fact, and as a matter of justice to old veterans, I don't think it would be a bad plan to retire Mr. Hawley at the November election.

FOUND DEAD.

Well known citizen of Rickreall Express. Yesterday evening about 6 o'clock someone strolling along the Rickreall just below the Burch footbridge came upon the dead body of a man, which, examination proved to be that of Richard Amon, an aged gentleman, and brother-in-law of Mr. Levi Koser, with whom he had been making his home. Mr. Amon has been in the habit of taking strolls up and down the creek, and it is surmised that he became attacked with heart failure and passed away. He had left the house about 3 o'clock for a ramble, and his absence had not yet occasioned uneasiness.

Mr. Amon had been a resident of this county some 20 years, was aged 82 years, and was a gentleman thoroughly respected for his many appreciable qualities.

At this date we are not able to secure anything further regarding his family connections or early life.

Undertaker R. L. Chapman went down last evening and prepared the body for burial, which will occur in the Odd Fellows graveyard at this place at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, an Evangelical minister having charge of the ceremonies.

Proposed Prohibition Search Law.

To the Editor: Will you kindly inform me regarding that portion of the proposed statewide prohibition law which gives officials the right to search private homes, if there is such a provision, and oblige.

CONSTANT READER.

Section 4 of the proposed prohibition law authorizes the sheriff and constables to force open any house to search for liquor and arrest the possessor. It reads as follows: Section 4. It is made the special duty of the district attorney to file or have filed a complaint in the circuit court of any county, or any justice's court therein, against ALL HOUSES and the keepers thereof, used for the manufacture, sale or exchange OF GIFT, for the purpose of evading this law, of any kind of intoxicating liquors in any county or in any town in this state where local devices are resorted to to prevent or avoid detection of the keeper thereof, and upon such complaint being so filed describing a place where such device is kept, and SUSPECTED of being kept, and the same of the person violating this law, if known, said circuit judge or justice of the peace, or other magistrate SHALL ISSUE HIS WARRANT COMMANDING ANY SHERIFF OR CONSTABLE TO SEARCH SUCH PLACE, and if the law is being violated to arrest the person or persons so violating the law, it shall be the duty of the sheriff or constable of the county wherein is situated any such PLACE OR HOUSE where such device is kept, for the sale or exchange of intoxicating liquors, OR THE GIFT OF the same for the purpose of evading this law, having obtained a warrant for that purpose, to demand admission into the same, and upon admittance being refused, the sheriff or constable is hereby AUTHORIZED AND REQUIRED BY LAW TO FORCE OPEN THE SAME, and arrest and hold for trial before the courts all such persons as shall violate any of the provisions of this law.

Protective Association.

President U. S. Million-Barrel Reservoir for Oil Fields.

Two concrete reservoirs for oil, said to be the largest in the world, are in the course of construction at San Luis Obispo, California, each of which will have a capacity of 1,000,000 bbl. of oil. The reservoirs are to cost half a million dollars, and the oil to fill them will be piped from the Bakersfield, Maricopa, Coalinga and Midway wells. When the tanks are filled, the oil will flow, by gravity, to the pumping station at San Luis Obispo, and from thence will be pumped directly to the tank steamers at Port Hartford. The November Popular Mechanics contains a panoramic view of one of these huge reservoirs in course of construction.

Dan Richardson Gone.

Tuesday afternoon his Masonic brethren laid to rest all that was mortal of Uncle Daniel B. Richardson, he having passed away Sunday afternoon at the ripe old age of nearly 70 years. He was one of the oldest members of that fraternity in the county, having first joined the Amity lodge. His funeral was preached at the home by Rev. WILLIAM GALLOWAY.

Circuit Judge Third Judicial District Candidate for Re-Election.

Judge Galloway is a pioneer, his parents crossing the plains in 1852 and settling on a donation claim near Perrydale in this county. Mr. Galloway was reared on a farm and has always taken a great interest in agriculture and stock raising, having been connected with the State Agricultural Society for more than twenty years. He served in the Legislature for six years as a member from Yamhill County, and was chairman of the Ways and Means Committee during the creation of the Capitol and other state buildings. Was County Judge of Yamhill County for four years, retiring with the County out of debt. Was appointed by Governor Lord as Trustee of the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg, resigning only to accept the appointment as Receiver of Public Moneys at the U. S. Land Office at Oregon City, where he served during parts of Cleveland's and Roosevelt's administrations and during all of McKinley's two administrations, accounting for nearly \$1,000,000 without the loss of one cent to the Government or its patrons.



Judge Galloway was elected to the Circuit Bench in 1904, during which time he has rendered many important decisions involving constitutional questions, such as the Crater Lake Wagon Road, the tide and overflow lands in Lincoln County, wherein perhaps a million dollars may be saved to the State, and other decisions of like importance.
