POLK GOES WET

West Elected Governor--Democrats Win Lower House of Congress--Break Even on State Governors

The Itemizer is coming out several hours late this week in order that it may give the official count of last Tuesday's election. Returns from the state are still in a chaotic way, but enough has come in to show West elected governor by anywhere from 1000 to 5000 votes; prohibition is defeated by maybe 10,000; woman suffrage is snowed under big; the Monmouth Normal probably won out; all county divisions lost out; Judge Burnett is advanced to the supreme bench, and Galway and Kelly will be our circuit judges; the home rule bill wins out, and several counties again go into the wet column, one of them being Polk; three democrats were elected in Polk, out of the five nominated; the balance of state and county republican ticket is safely elected.

COUNCIL MEETING.

Dogs Will be Taxed After the First of the Year.

The city council met in regular session last Monday evening, with all officials present.

Hall, of the street committee recommended that the newly finished macadam block on Washington, between Shelton and Lyle, be accepted by the city and that a number of new sidewalks be laid on the same. The street committee recommended that the surplus water in the western part of town, be sent down Maple street, and the street commissioner was ordered to attend to the job.

The quarterly reports of the city treasurer and auditor were read and referred to the finance committee.

A warrant was ordered drawn on the street fund in favor of the Dallas Macadam company for \$1081 in full for work to date.

A bill was presented by Mrs. Rhoda Ellis for \$500 for injuries alleged to have been sustained on the 19th of last June by a loose board being stepped on by a lady who was walking with her along the property occupied by W. G. Vassall, the board striking her on the wrist and causing injuries that has kept her from work since that time. The bill was first disallowed, and then the motion reconsidered and the matter referred to Fenton, Coad and Ayres to look into.

A petition was read requesting an order at the junction of Washington street and Fairview avenue. Referred to the fire and water committee.

A resolution and ordinance providing for new sidewalks was read first time.

The famous dog license came up for second reading, and was passed. It fixes the yearly tax for a male dog at \$3 and of a bitch at \$2. It is to become effective January 1, 1911.

The matter of purchasing a street sweeper for our macadam streets was brought up, and the street committee and councilman Ayres authorized to get terms, prices, etc.

Bids were received for the building of cement crosswalks from two parties at about \$62 each, and this matter held up until the purchase of a sweeper is decided.

The Brown heirs were ordered to put drain pipes for their roof water under cement walk on Main, and other cement walk were ordered fixed.

S'not by Polk County Man.

An accident which might have proved fatal happened last Sunday when Clyde Bowning was shot by Dan Taylor of Independence. A physician was summoned at once to come from Sheridan and attend the injured man. The bullet was found to have passed through the back, hitting the liver and kidney, coming out between the short ribs. He is reported as improving nicely at present.--Tillamook Headlight.
