NORMAL CELEBRATES.

Many Friends of Institution Gather at Monmouth.

Culwicks and just which for 10 months have been gathering behind the locked doors and windows of the Oregon Normal school here were jared loose today when nearly 300 alumni from various parts of the state, public officials and residents of Monmouth gathered for an all-day celebration to hail the return of old conditions, which will place the historic institution under a system of maintenance by the state.
For the first time in two years the air of gloom, which has lingered over Monmouth, was dispelled by the arrival of college yells that greeted the arrivals on every train, coming from the throats of a big delegation of former students, who began to see a chance to realize the completion of their Normal course.
The main feature of the day was a gathering of the alumni, which was held in the gymnasium. Addresses were given by many leading educators of the state and men who were active in the fight for the Monmouth school. The assembly hall was well filled, it being estimated there were over 3000 visitors in the city.
The assembly hall of Monmouth, delivered the address of welcome, being introduced by J. B. V. Butler, who acted as chairman. The address was a brief history of the school, which was a worthy of a continuous lease of life.
Superintendent of Public Instruction J. H. Ackerman, in mentioning the vote passed for the normal, was given a tremendous ovation when he spoke of Multnomah's plurality of 6012 for this bill.
E. D. Resler, for several president at Monmouth, was given an ovation that lasted several minutes. He dwelt at some length on the local spirit, pride and enthusiasm that had marked Monmouth.
C. N. McArthur advocated the establishment of three normal schools in the state.
President P. L. Campbell, of the University of Oregon, son of the ex-president at Monmouth, and himself also an ex-president of the strongest speakers of the afternoon and was also accorded a round of applause.
C. L. Starr, ex-secretary of the board of normal regents, created a sensation when he applied the term of "the grand old educator in the state of Oregon" to Mayor Lickley.
Among the other speakers were F. E. Chambers, of Toledo, joint representative of Benton counties, and C. L. Hawley, of McCoy, joint senator from Polk and Benton. The invocation was offered by Rev. Dunsmore, of Independence, and there were vocal solos by Mrs. George Conker, of Independence; Mrs. Allen Clark, of Monmouth; and Rev. Davis. A reception followed the program.
In the morning a sumptuous banquet was served by the Monmouth Women's Reading club in the historic old gymnasium of the Normal grounds. Nearly 500 people sat down at the tables. The hall was prettily decorated and at each table were cards bearing the inscription, "Welcome the O. S. N. S. 1901; Multnomah 6012." Indicating the majority received by the Monmouth bill from the state at large and from Multnomah county.
Following the banquet the guests adjourned to the assembly hall of the school, where the programme was given. Monmouth Normal school history extends back to 1859, established primarily for the purpose of educating the children of the pioneers who resided in this immediate neighborhood.
Mrs. Elizabeth Lucas is probably the only living person who aided in originally establishing the institution, her husband, A. W. Lucas, now dead, donating some of the land which now constitutes the normal school grounds. Grandmother Lucas was unable to be present at the celebration, owing to her advanced age, but she appreciated the reinstatement of the normal school as much as any.
During the 50th Christian denomination took over the Monmouth university and the school was rechristened Christian college. In 1890 T. F. Campbell became president of the school. His son, P. L. Campbell, is now president of the University of Oregon. President T. F. Campbell was a lawyer, a minister, and an educator. In all he ranked high, but he was best known as an educator.

and in the early days under his influence Christiana college became one of the most powerful educational factors in the Northwest.

In 1882 J. D. Lee, of Dallas, presented a bill at the legislature which became a law and which created the Oregon normal school from the Christian college.

For 10 years this normal was conducted without appropriation of any kind from the state, but in 1893 the school received its first appropriation and was fostered and developed by the state until the legislature saw fit to rip out the normal schools by refusing to further appropriate money for their existence. Once more the people of this vicinity showed their loyalty to the historic institution and nearly \$10,000 was raised. For two years the school was financed by private subscriptions. There is still a little money in the treasury.
It is the hope of the Monmouth people to see the school reopened next September. Whether this will be possible is a question of some doubt, inasmuch as the bill provides for a normal school fund, and it is not fully decided whether the levy will come from this year's taxes or next, as adherents of a bare possibility that the school cannot open until 1912, although Monmouth people believe it possible for the legislature to avoid this contingency by an appropriation. The state board of normal regents will have control of the school. Monmouth people seem to be universally in favor of the reinstatement of E. D. Resler, president of the school.
The committee that promoted the campaign for the Monmouth Alumni Association consisted of Wm. D. Fenton, Judge Barnett, J. C. McCue, J. B. Butler, Ira J. Fowler and A. C. Hampton. Mr. Butler stated the committee is desirous of extending its most heartfelt thanks to the press of the state for the almost unlimited assistance given in promoting the work of the association in its fight for the bill.

Pioneer Polkite Dead.

Mrs. G. W. Wilson died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Jos. Elkins, in this city, Saturday, November 19, 1910. After an illness of several months, at the age of 84 years, 3 months and 3 days. The deceased's maiden name was Mary Ann Moore. She was born in Pennsylvania August 16, 1826, and was married to Mr. Wilson in Iowa in 1835, and with them she crossed the plains by ox team in 1842 and settled in Polk county. In 1860 they moved to Linn county and settled near Lebanon, and since 1880 they have moved several times, but have never moved farther than six miles from Lebanon. Mrs. Wilson was the mother of 14 children, 12 of whom grew to maturity, and nine of whom survive her. Her husband preceded her to the great beyond, and she was followed by the following are the names of the children that are living: Mrs. Jos. Elkins, A. M. Wilson, Mrs. Fannie Claypool, Mrs. Susan Claypool, Wm. Wilson, Mrs. A. N. Reed, Mrs. Rhoda Huston, Jos. Wilson and John Wilson. When quite young Mrs. Wilson joined the M. E. church and has always lived a Christian life and was loved and respected by all who knew her. Mr. E. L. Lee conducted the funeral services in the Methodist church yesterday afternoon, after which the remains were laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery. The cause of her husband--Lebanon Express.

Grant Two Saloon Licenses.

The Independence city council has granted two saloon licenses, one to Moss Walker and A. Whitney, and the other to J. B. Cooper. An ordinance was passed by the council to regulate the saloon business, the conditions of which are that the license fee shall be \$100 for each saloon; a limit of one saloon to every 1000 population or major fraction, and the houses in the saloon shall be \$800 each. Windows are to be regulated by ordinance, the lower edges of which are not to be over four and a half feet above the sidewalk and partitions and screens are prohibited. All games in saloons, whether for pleasure or money, are prohibited. The ordinance but two saloons will be licensed.

As the results of the recent tryouts the Falls City High School will be represented in the state and county debating league by Ella M. Mehrling, Lavon Gotfred, Leslie Toome, Lavilla Buell, Herbert Hansen, Lamar Toome. Last year Falls City was winner of the Polk County High School Debating league and became the possessor of the Seymour silver cup. The triangular or dual system will be employed in this year's debate.
