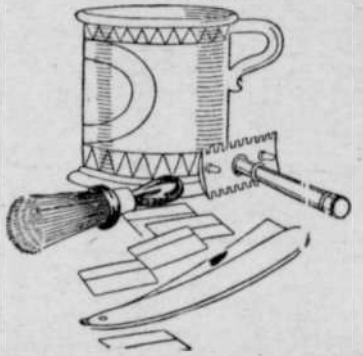

### Former Polk Resident Dies.

George W. Wilcox, who crossed the plains in the forties, passed away yesterday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Sarah E. Vauhom, 1109 East Salmon street. Mr. Wilcox was born September 25, 1830, and the cause of his death is attributed to old age. Mr. Wilcox came to Oregon country in 1847 with his parents and settled in Vancouver, Wash. His father and mother died soon after this and he moved over and settled in Washington county, Oregon, where he met and married Miss Mary E. Dickerson. To this union four children were born, one daughter and three sons. In 1880 they moved to Polk county and lived there until 1902 when they moved to Portland. Later they moved to Sandy, Ore., and lived with a son, T. H. Wilcox, until they recently returned to Portland. Mr. Wilcox was a member of the Oregon Pioneer society and always arranged to be at their reunions. He leaves one daughter, Sarah E. Vauhom, and three sons, Tracy, Jacob and Felix. He had 10 grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren.—Friday's Oregonian.

### After Market for Goats.

Jas. Riddle, of Riddle & Sons, of Monmouth, Oregon, was in Portland and visited us for a day. "I had a good many things to look after while in town, among these was a possible market for Angora venison. We visited several of the leading markets and the general impression was that immediately after January 1st, prices would be better than at present. In other words, the outlook was promising. Mr. Weber has been in business in Creswell for more than 15 years, and is one of the pioneers of the town. He will retire from business and will continue to make his home there.

### A Former Dallas Boy.

A. L. Shreve, proprietor of the Stayton electric light plant, states that he has just completed the deal for the purchase of a power site three miles up the Santiam river from Stayton. The site is a desirable one and capable of generating about 5000 horse power. It is Mr. Shreve's plan to clean out the drift, build the headgate and do considerably other preliminary work this winter and in the course of a year build a big modern power house on the site, which is located on the north side of the river. The Stayton light and power plant has been taxed beyond its capacity and frequently the power has failed when it was most needed. This new move of Mr. Shreve's therefore means much to Stayton.—Stayton Mail.

Mrs. H. J. Farley, of Dallas, recently shipped one of her fine registered bucks to Mr. G. G. Belle, of "The Edgewood Farm," at Harrisburg, Oregon. This buck was sired by "King Arthur, Jr.," who was grand champion on the fair circuit of 1908. Mr. Belle expects to exhibit at the Portland show and as the buck is an extra fine individual, much is expected of him.—Agriculturist.

### Chrysanthemum Show.

The ladies of the Independence Methodist church, beginning Friday afternoon and continuing over Saturday gave a Chrysanthemum show for the benefit of the new church which was recently dedicated by President Fletcher Holman of Willamette University. The fair was a decided success and many prizes were given for Chrysanthemum exhibits. Besides the flowers there were booths filled with all kinds of Christmas presents of the kind that are useful and fancy. In the evening a very pleasant program was given, consisting of vocal and instrumental music and readings by Perry Reigman, of Willamette University, the Glee club studentman. After the program a social was given in the basement of the church, which is fitted up especially for such events and is a model in its way. Under the pastorage of Rev. Weber a graduate of the Kinnall school of theology of Willamette university, the church has grown and has been recently remodeled, and is now one of the best arranged church buildings in the state. The people of Independence are all enthusiastic over the success of their fair and feel a just pride in their church and pastor. Much of the success of the fair is due to the work of Mrs. Dr. L. L. Hewitt, president of the Ladies Aid of that church, which society agreed to raise \$500 to defray the expense of the improvements, which amounts in all to about \$5700.—Statesman.

### A Fashion Chat on Misses Frocks

The simple lines which characterize the present styles are especially becoming to the graceful figures of young girls. While retaining all of this simplicity many beautiful frocks are developed in the dainty silk and cotton tissues, colored linen, batiste or linen, which may be worked all over in an eyelet design; simpler frocks but charming in their way, are made of the most inexpensive ginghams, chambrays, dimity and figured lawns. The young girl in her teens is one who can wear the open-neck waist with impunity, and to her it is universally becoming. The style of the neck may be square, round or cut in a little deeper outline and the plaited or gathered frill is a dainty addition. Then the same frock may have a lace yoke and collar added if desired.

The dresses for misses are delightfully girlish. The designs are simple in line and are made up with just enough decoration, whatever the trimming may be, to suggest a dainty effect without appearing elaborate. Colored and white dress linen are immensely popular for frocks, sailor and coat suits. Then, too, there are several linen finished fabrics such as ramsie, hepper cloth and pongee that are less expensive than linen and are made up in the same way. The daintiest of thin dresses are made of dimity and batiste, dimity being less expensive but charming whether plain white, cross-stitched or printed in delicate yellow, green and brown floral effects or in bold colors with dots. Batiste that is covered with embroidered dots, small figures or has a fancy stripe trim itself suitably.

Side plaited ruffles are used to trim dresses of soft materials, and one of the newest ideas in skirts is illustrated in PICTORIAL REVIEW PATTERN No. 363. This frock is simple and charming in every line and so girlish that none but a girl in her teens would look well in it.

It is made with a lining having one-steam sleeves perforated for shorter length, high or round neck, sleeve-caps combined with outer front and back and attached seven-gored skirt lengthened by a circular flounce with straight side-plaited ruffles. Sizes 14, 16 and 18 years. Size 16 requires 6 1/2 yards of 44-inch material.

PICTORIAL REVIEW PATTERN No. 363 is an attractive garment that conveys a suggestion of youthfulness. The dainty frill around the neck can be made of plaited lace or silk of contrasting color, if so desired.

There is absolutely nothing on this dress in the way of trimming except this little frill and still it has a dainty appearance. It is the style and cut of the garment and this is what gives distinction to Pictorial Review patterns.

This costume is also made with a lining, either high or low neck, three-quarter length sleeves and has an attached five-gored skirt lengthened by a straight gathered flounce. Sizes are 14, 16 and 18 years and a medium size requires 2 1/2 yards of 40 inch material.
