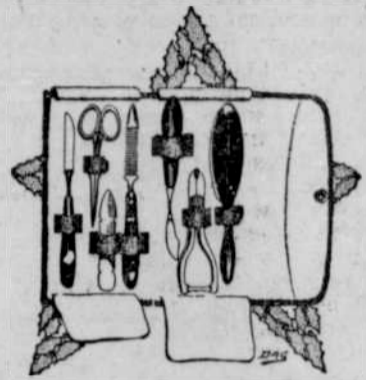

All Want Commission.

Dissension in the management of the Falls City Orchard company, a local concern, resulted yesterday in the filing against J. W. Benson, manager and sales agent of the company, of a charge of embezzling about \$4000 of the funds of the company. Back of the charge is said to be backings which have for a long time made it almost impossible to hold a meeting of the stockholders. While it is known that the matter has been laid before the district attorney, for some reason no warrant has been issued for Benson's arrest, and the district attorney is reticent concerning the nature of the complaint. Mr. Benson, who is at the head of the Benson Land company, with offices in the Wells Fargo building, says that the charges against him grew out of the fact that he purchased a tract of land at Falls City and turned it over to the company, which he organized at an agreed price and at a profit to himself, aggregating about the amount that he is charged with embezzling. He said that certain stockholders feel that he should turn into the funds of the company the profit he made on the land. He announces that he will file suit for defamation of character against W. Van Zante and F. G. Pringle, whom he blames for the prosecution.—Oregonian.

Western Oregon Minister Injured

Rev. C. A. Wooley, one of the oldest ministers in Western Oregon, fell from the porch of his house in Fairmount, Thursday, sustaining him unconscious and breaking his collar bone.—Oregonian.

Independence Elects.

New city officers have been elected at Independence as follows: Mayor, W. F. Hoffman; councilmen, Messrs. Mix, Hubbard and Bohannon; recorder, W. S. Kurre. At the first meeting in January the council will proceed to elect a treasurer and marshal and it is presumed that the present officers will be re-elected.

Auto is Set Afire.

An attempt to burn an automobile belonging to Henry Lady, stored in Burt Brooks' garage was made Wednesday morning. The garage was closed for the winter and three machines were stored in it. Cashier Beck found the machine burning. A can of lubricating oil with the lid off was on the fire near the center and an open 5-gallon can of gasoline was at the rear. Large quantities of gasoline and lubricating oils were stored within a few feet of the burning car.—Oregonian.

Thos. Inghram, of Bethel, was seriously injured on Saturday afternoon.

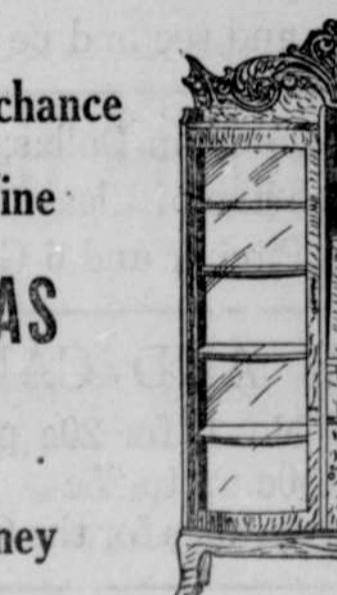
