

LA CREOLE BOOSTERS ELECT.

Interest Aroused in Proposed Efforts to Boost Dallas.

The advent of the New Year was marked by an enthusiastic meeting of the La Creole Club, in their rooms in the I. O. O. F. building Sunday afternoon, at which tentative plans were discussed for arousing greater interest and concerted action in advancing the commercial affairs of Dallas and Tarrant County. The occasion was the annual meeting and election of officers of the club, and the members are pleased with the progressive spirit shown.

Officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: President, W. V. Fuller; Vice President, U. S. Loughery; Secretary, Tracy Staats; Treasurer, W. G. Vassall; Board of Trustees, V. L. PORTLAND PLAYERS BALK.

Portland Basketball Manager Orders Team Off Court.

Refusing to recognize the right of Walter Ballantyne, a last year's student of Dallas College, to play with this year's team in a contest against a basketball team of the Portland Young Men's Christian Association, the manager of the Portland "Spartans" ordered his men from the court in the college gymnasium, Saturday night, after the preliminary "warming up" and just as the referee was preparing to blow the whistle to put the ball in play. Deaf to the pleading of friends of both teams, the Spartans' manager refused to reconsider his decision and the large crowd which had assembled to witness the game fled out of the building grievously disappointed. The Portland team left for home on the early train Sunday morning.

Charles Shaw, manager of the Dallas team, places the blame for the failure of the teams to meet entirely upon the Portland manager. He says the Dallas boys were unable to play their regular team on account of the absence of Norval Gates, and adds that the manager of the Spartans was not only aware of the proposed substitution of Ballantyne but that he offered no objection until after both teams had appeared on the gymnasium floor. Manager Shaw contends that inasmuch as the Spartans are not official representatives of the Portland Y. M. C. A., and have played teams other than college and association teams this winter, they had no right to object to a substitution of players on the Dallas team after they had been duly notified of the proposed change before appearing on the gymnasium floor. The Dallas manager submitted to the Observer the following signed statement for publication:

Manager Shaw's Statement. "As a number of Dallas basketball enthusiasts probably have not learned why the game arranged with the Spartans was called off Saturday night, after the teams were on the floor, these considerations, being to the best of our knowledge the salient facts in the case, are submitted: "The Spartans is the name of a team composed of men who are affiliated with the Portland Y. M. C. A. "They are not recognized as the representatives of the Portland association, but are, so far as that organization is concerned, self-chosen and self-managed. "They are subject to no restriction as to scholastic registration or standing, and hence have much more freedom than have college teams in relation to other college teams. "They are known in Dallas acquainted with the fact that one of the regular members of the Dallas team was not to be in the lineup and that in his absence, (which alone was the reason for the change), a member of last year's team had been secured for the game. "To this proposed change in the lineup, the Spartans interposed no objection whatever, either at the Gail Hotel or in their own dressing room, previous to going onto the court, in both of which places they were in conversation with the Dallas manager. "But after going through their preliminary 'warming up' and having some discussion with a few Dallas men who seemed particularly interested in the Spartans as a winning team, the Spartans manager objected to the Dallas lineup, and on being unable to pull things through his own way, withdrew his men from the court. "The incoherence of the Spartans is further shown in the statement made that they are playing only Y. M. C. A. and straight college teams. Questioned as to what kind of team they played at Silverton, the Spartans' manager answered that it was a Y. M. C. A. team. But Silverton's team is of an athletic club. "The disagreement and the consequent calling off of the contest are to be regretted sincerely, but personally I feel there was very slight excuse for the obstinacy manifested by the visitors Saturday night. "In our games with the other college teams, we intend to abide by the regulations governing the same, and in case of any but a college team being played hereafter, to avoid all possibility of a disagreement by a frank understanding before the teams go on the court, if occasion should ever demand the use of any other than college players. We felt certain that the Spartans would offer no objection to our lineup, under the existing circumstances, but unfortunately we were mistaken. "These statements are made frankly as an explanation and as well as a criticism of the greatest of all men's organizations, of which the Spartans are members. "C. L. SHAW. "D. C. B. R. Team."
