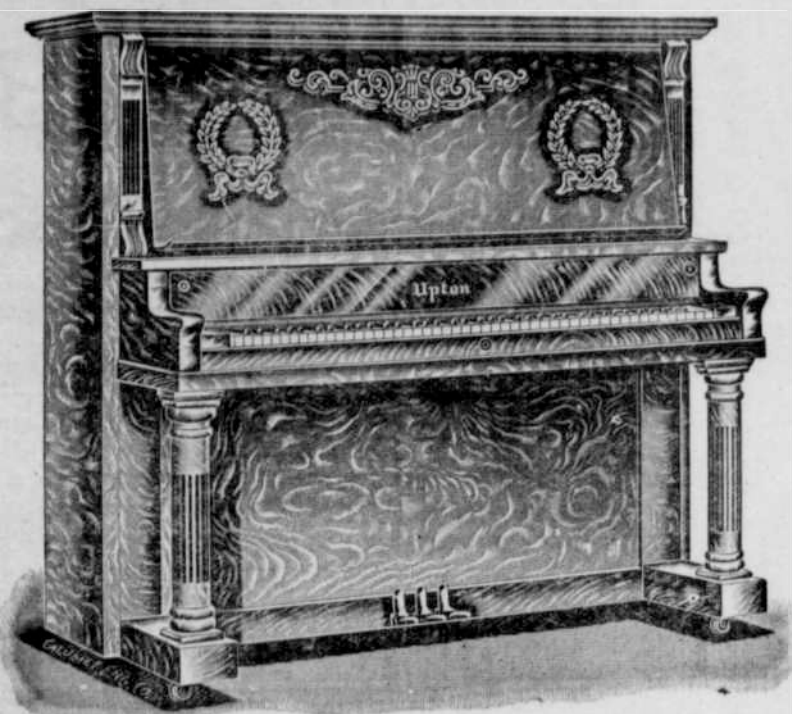

Good Money in Goats.

Last fall Mr. J. L. Brown purchased 120 goats for \$120 to assist in clearing off the land on his Salt Creek farm. Lately, not waiting for the Dallas pool, and thereby losing some money, he sold his mohair in Sheridan for \$120, getting back the original money paid out. His first flock is now increased by 79 kids, and all the expense he has been put to is to their care. This he gives in unlimited quantity, and the result is that he has saved every kid, while many have died elsewhere. If you attend to them, there is good money in goats even at present low prices.
