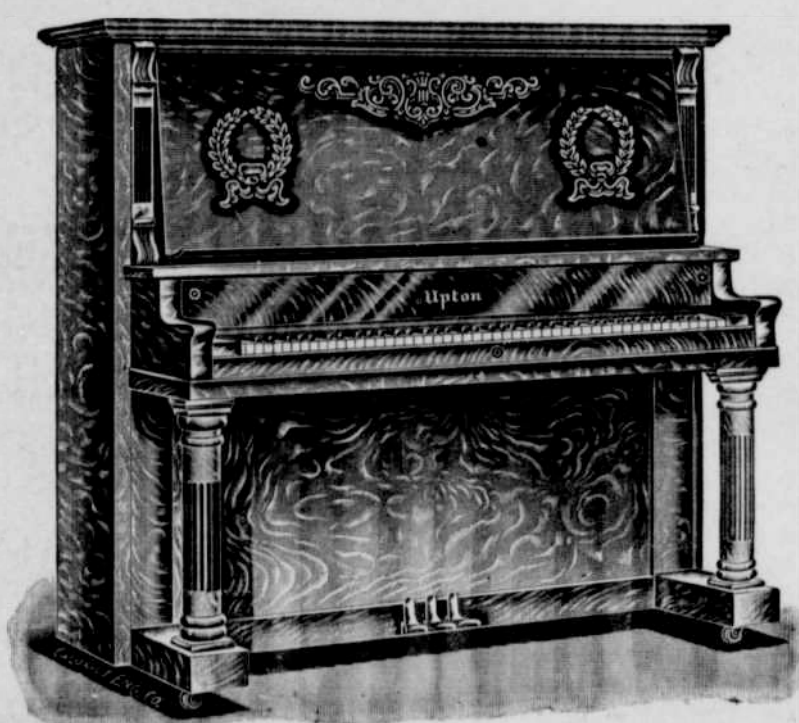

OCCUPATION TAX.

What it will Cost our Different
Industries by the Quarter.

At the city council last Monday evening an ordinance was read first time which provides for the licensing of every business in Dallas, the money thus raised to be placed in a special fund and applied toward the cost of sprinkling our macadam streets and paying the night policeman. The schedule of taxation, which may be somewhat changed before passage, is as follows:

\$7.50 a quarter—Department stores.
\$5 a quarter—Groceries, dry goods, hardware, furniture, variety, confectioneries, meat markets, hotels, feed stores, restaurants, drugs, music, millinery, second hand, bakeries, boots and shoes, merchandise, trucks and transfers, banks, telephone companies, express companies, water works companies, sawmills.
\$3 a quarter—Livery stables, blacksmith shops, gun shops, bicycle shops, plumbing shops, tinners shops, harness shops, shoe shops, creameries, cigar factories, barber shops, tailor shops, candy kitchens, vendors, garages, physicians, lawyers, abstractors, dentists, photographers, real estate, insurance, undertakers, collectors, teams for hire, autos for hire, delivery wagons, flouring mills, tanneries, ice plants, soda works, florists, newspapers.

A number of other institutions are named, but left blank until final passage. In most instances, the amount named will be less than is now being paid out for sprinkling and nightwatch, the purpose of the ordinance being to secure an equitable distribution of this necessary expense, and not allow one business to pay and the next one not. It also puts the management of these matters under one head.

ANOTHER BRICK.

J. W. Crider will Build Two
Stories at Mill and Jefferson.

Mr. J. M. Campbell received notice yesterday to vacate the building he is now occupying as a general repair shop on Mill street, and next week the work of removing the wooden buildings between the Sterling Furniture company's brick and the corner will be commenced. The one Mr. Campbell is in will be torn down, but what disposition will be made of the one being used by the furniture store is not known, it being the property of Frank Chapman. As soon as the ground is cleared Mr. J. W. Crider will come up from San Jose, and the work of putting up a two story brick commenced on that site. The new brick will have a frontage of 80 feet on Mill street, and contain three store rooms. Two of these will be used by the Sterling Furniture company, and the corner store be for rent. The upstairs will be used for office or lodge rooms. The building will be modern in every particular.

Breeze Gibson Sells a Ranch.

The old reliable, attenuated and inimitable "Breeze" Gibson was in town yesterday, and after being sufficiently primed he unfolded to a representative of the Statesman the details of a sale he has recently consummated. It seems that "Breeze" has, or rather had, two ranches over the river in Polk county and that he has sold one of them—the 140-acre one—to Dr. Starbuck and Louis Gerlinger, both of Dallas, for a consideration of \$70 per acre, which makes the sum total that "Breeze" thinks ought to float a battleship. The new purchasers expect to put out 75 acres of prunes. "Breeze" says he might have put them out himself, but the time has come for him to look back on what he has done in place of looking ahead to what he might do—Salem Statesman.
