Dies in Arizona.

The following from Tuesday's Oregonian concerns the death of a local girl law of our esteemed townsman, J. J. Williams. "Word was received in Portland yesterday of the death of Henry Fuller, aged 72, an Oregon pioneer of 1845, at Nogales, Arizona, May 8. Mr. Fuller came to Oregon with one of the first parties of immigrants, settling in Polk county, where he married Miss Malissa A. Williams. In 1849 he journeyed to California, during the rush to the gold mines, later returning to Portland, associating himself with Amos King in the first tannery in Portland, situated on the site now owned by the Multnomah Club. In later years Mr. Fuller opened the Fulton Market, on First and Yamhill streets.
