COMMERCIAL CLUB.

Proposal Received for a Hardwood Working Establishment.

The regular biweekly meeting of the Commercial club was called to order last night at 8:30 by President Muir, a good attendance of members being in evidence.

The president appointed the following soliciting committee: Mrs. Geo. Gerlinger, Mrs. F. H. Morrison, R. E. Williams, J. R. Craven, J. C. Hayter, Sam Gibson. This is the committee appointed by resolution at the last meeting to assist in the matter of raising a building fund for the college of \$20,000.

Numerous bills were presented and referred to the finance committee.

President Muir announced that he had received a telegram from Mr. Swetland, representing the packing company from California, announcing that a meeting would be held Saturday next to definitely settle the location.

Edwin Jacobson presented a proposal from Mr. Kilbourne, of Washington, who desired to locate here in the manufactory of wheelbarrows, singletrees, and other articles of hardwood manufacture. He asked a site, and a subsidy of \$500, for which he would put in a plant capable of doing very diversified work. Judge Brown moved that the matter be referred to the executive committee to be looked up. This brought forth considerable discussion, the sense of the members being that if the business justified, the conditions would be met without hesitancy. The motion carried, and the matter was left to the committee for immediate investigation.

Coad moved that when we adjourn it be to meet at the call of the executive committee.

Moved by Loughary that the secretary be instructed to force all subscriptions and show no favors or leniency.

Mr. Loughary brought up the matter of a larger membership, claiming that every citizen should be a member, and should include even the farmers of the near vicinity. Mr. Winter thought so too, that everyone should be given a chance to help out in a financial way. He moved the appointment of a committee for that purpose, which was carried, and the president appointed Prof. Winter, C. B. Sundberg and F. J. Coad to act on the same.

Mr. VanOrsdel brought up the matter of what is known as the VanOrsdel road, and asked for the hearty co-operation of the club to see the road put through. Mr. Woods moved that the commercial club go on record as in favor of the proposed road. The motion was passed unanimously, and a committee of five was appointed to present this action before the court at the July term. W. L. Soehren, E. Jacobson, C. Stafrin, V. P. Fiske and W. V. Fuller were appointed.

Secretary Ross brought up the matter of a cleanup day, thinking the grass should be cut from the streets and other cleaning effected. No action.

Messrs. Guy and Jacobson brought up the celebration of Pioneer day, the last Saturday in June. Guy moved a committee of three be appointed to arrange for the same, and H. L. Fenton, W. A. Ayres and W. L. Soehren were appointed.

The matter of cleanup was brought up again, Soehren, Coad and Loughary speaking in favor of the same, and Patterson favoring a lady auxiliary to the club for that and other purposes for which they would do more effective work than could be done by the men.

Williams Brick Commenced.

The buildings occupying the site have now all been moved to the opposite side of Court street, and Contractor Oscar Holmes has had a gang of men at work all week cleaning off debris, excavating, putting in the concrete foundations and getting ready for actual brick laying. Manager Partridge informs us that the brick will be burned today and that delivery will commence Monday.

Foully Murdered

H. C. DIMICK GONE.

Passed Away at McMinnville Tuesday Night Last.

At 2 o'clock tomorrow will be laid to rest all that was mortal of Henry Dimick, so well known to all for many years as the driver of the hack between Dallas and Derry, which vocation gave him a large acquaintanceship all over the state. The government never had a more faithful or efficient servant, and he was punctuality itself, many of us oldtimers regulating our actions by the times of his four daily passages down our main street, to and from trains. He was a man of generous impulses, jovial and obliging, and his many friends will with great regret drop a tear for his passing. He was taken ill only a few weeks ago, and has suffered greatly since that time, relief from pain coming about four days before his demise. He had gone to McMinnville for medical treatment from a specialist, but received no betterment, and passed away Tuesday night, the remains being brought home Wednesday evening. Perfectly resigned to death, he simply folded his hands and peacefully entered the realms beyond.

On going to press funeral arrangements have not been entirely perfected, but will occur from the house at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon, interment taking place in Dallas cemetery. Henry Dimick was born in 1843 at Newcomertown, Ohio, when only a lad moving with his parents to Ottawa, Illinois, where in 1866 he married Ophelia Wrightman. They came to Oregon in 1875, and have since then resided in this vicinity.

He was a veteran of the civil war, having served in the Illinois cavalry, and it was very entertaining to hear him tell of some of his experiences during that period, when he happened to be in a reminiscent mood.

Besides a faithful and loving wife he leaves to mourn his loss, four children, Mrs. Clara Rowell, of Penewa, who will not be able to attend the funeral, Mrs. Laura Siefarth of Dallas, Arthur of Dallas, and Jasper of Tillamook.

The grand army veterans will have charge of the funeral cortege, by especial request of Mr. Dimick, and Mr. Koser desires to state that all veterans are particularly requested to turn out.

PIONEER PICNIC.

KREBS HURT IN RUNAWAY.

Independence Hopgrower Remains Unconscious; Death Feared.

Mike Krebs, a prominent hop grower, of Independence, was thrown from his buggy early Sunday, while driving to his home south of this city, and seriously injured.

As he was driving down Hill Hill his horse became frightened and started to run. Mr. Krebs was thrown from the buggy, striking a large rock 15 feet from the road and rendered unconscious. He has not yet regained his senses.

He was found by the roadside several hours after the accident and taken to his home in an auto, where he is lying in a critical condition. The attending physician believes there is little hope of his recovery.

PICNIC SUCCESS.

The Artisans and School Teachers Give Much Pleasure.

With weather all that could be asked, everyone in the mood to attend, and a finely designed and executed program, there was nothing to mar the picnic given by the United Artisans and school teachers at Rickreall on last Saturday. Every train arriving was loaded with pleasure-seekers, and autos and vehicles swelled the crowd until it is estimated at least 5000 were present. The exercises of the morning consisted of the graduation of all eighth grade pupils, comprising some 175 in numbers, and as an inspiration to all beholders. Alderman gave an address, followed by another song from Misses Jean McInturf, Lovetta Shore, Ruby Frame and Kathryn Hughes, after which Gov. Oswald West took the rostrum. This was followed by the awarding of the diplomas to the eighth grade pupils, a young Grand Ronde Indian being one of the recipients. Another short followed, Superintendent Seymour gave thanks for the many blessings of the day and the morning passed away with a ball game between Artisan teams from Whiteson and Wellsdale, the former team winning out.

The Artisans took the floor in the afternoon, and under the direction of Mrs. Mary J. Burch, master of the Rickreall lodge, a most creditable program was rendered. The supreme treasure, J. W. Mills, of Portland, made an address, a Dallas quartet sang, and then Supreme Master H. S. Hudson gave a talk on fraternalism. Governor West then spoke again, and the women's quartet, of Salem, sang a pleasing selection, followed by an address by Mrs. Ella Watt of Salem, who occupied the position of supreme instructor. The Dallas College quartet sang and Miss Myrtle Penn, of Salem, read a selection. The Dallas band interspersed music throughout, which received many compliments.
