Patronize One Another for the Upbuilding of Town and County.

Favorable opportunities do not usually stand at the door knocking for admission, but are more frequently caught in the attempt to pass us by many times on the run.

Last Friday 23 autos took 110 Corvallis business men for an all day trip over Benton county for the purpose of getting acquainted with the residents of the smaller towns. This is what the Itemizer has been trying to get Dallas business men to do.

A church organization for men, with no collections of any kind, and where the members may bring their pipes and smoke during the services, is the ideal church society, according to Rev. The purpose of the feature is to get as many merchants as choose to do so, to offer the biggest bargain for a dollar that they can and to advertise these bargains as extensively as possible. One merchant advertises one thing and another something else, each making his offering as attractive as possible. There are unlimited possibilities in this scheme for a big day, and it can be worked out advantageously to the merchant as well as the customer.

During the next three months the regular Saturday night band concerts are going to prove quite an attraction for those living both in and out of our city. No better music is furnished by any organization in the valley, and any one will feel well paid for listening to them for an hour and a half. It is proposed to also offer other features of entertainment on those nights, such as races, drills, etc., so that an added interest will be given to the music. This can easily be developed into an entertainment that will be certain to draw large crowds to our city every Saturday night, and none will be the loser by so doing at a time of week when their work is over and they all feel in the humor for a little relaxation of a pleasurable nature.

Every day there comes to the Itemizer office several letters sent out by the promoters of different fairs, colleges, meets, etc., which we are generously permitted to publish free of charge. Of course those letters find the waste basket in very short order, many of them unopened. The time was when a country editor really welcomed such dope, as it gave the compositors something to be working on, and saved him the trouble of hunting up the home news. That time has passed, and unless a paper is now full of live local news it will soon have to take a back seat, if it has competition. People want their town news and nothing else in their local paper, getting a surfeit of the other stuff from the large metropolitan daily or weekly that all of them also subscribe for.

FEDERAL REGULATION OF SUNDAY.

The Hon. Jacob H. Gallinger, Senator in the Congress of the United States from New Hampshire, may represent the railroads and corporations as charged by certain radical reformers, but he is still a staunch and uncompromising foe of the Sabbath breaker.

DR. J. A. RICHARDSON DIES.

Physician, 70, Once Prominent in Oregon Politics, Passes Away.

Dr. James A. Richardson, 70 years old, pioneer physician and politician, died at his home at 1103 Francis avenue, in Woodstock, Sunday afternoon.

Dr. Richardson was a native of Illinois, and with his parents, he crossed the plains to Oregon in 1851 and settled in the Willamette Valley. He was educated at the Bethel academy in Polk county, and at the age of 23 graduated at the Cooper Medical college at San Francisco. He practiced for several years at McMinnville, later removing to The Dalles, where he formed a partnership with Dr. Hugh Logan. For the last 35 years he resided in Salem. Owing to failing health Dr. Richardson gave up his practice two years ago and, with his family, moved to Portland.

Dr. Richardson was active in politics in former years. He was a member of the Union State Convention held by the Union party in Corvallis in 1869, representing Yamhill county. He was also a delegate to the Republican state conventions of 1880 and 1884 from Wasco county. During his residence in Salem he was mayor of that city, member of the legislature and physician at the insane asylum.

In 1871 Dr. Richardson was married to Miss Fannie Boyd. He is survived by his widow, a son, Dr. Boyd M. Richardson, of this city, and a daughter, Frances K. Richardson.—Oregonian.

Artistic Work.
