

PIONEER PICNIC.

The Reunion will be Held in Dallas On June 24th.

Arrangements for the holding of the 24th annual reunion of Polk county pioneers are about completed, and all signs point to one of the happiest events of the two dozen so far held.

The committee on general arrangements and finance, appointed at a recent meeting of the Commercial club and consisting of H. L. Fenton, W. A. Ayres and W. L. Soehren, have named the following citizens to assist them in different capacities:

The several committees met last night and outlined the following program, which will be given with probably some minor changes:

After dinner will occur the regular annual business meeting of the association; and the pioneers will have the city park for a social time. Suitable prizes will be given to the oldest and earliest pioneer present, also the oldest pioneer couple.

At the college campus, commencing at 1:30, there will be races, pillow fights and a tug-of-war for suitable prizes, lasting until 3:30, when the old Alerts will play a game of baseball with a picked nine of Pioneers.

At 3:30 the Dallas Grays and the Chemawa Indians will have a game.

From 6:30 to 7 on Main street Company H will give an exhibition drill.
At 7 there will be a horse race. From 7:30 to 9 will occur the regular band concert of Saturday night on the court house plaza. This promises to be one of the

most interesting sessions our pioneers have ever had. While their ranks have been considerably thinned during the past year, yet coming as it does at this time, with nothing else to detract from attendance and interest, there is no reason why it should not be a record event.

Death has called from us today the dear little wife and mother you knew so long and well. Kindly give notice to the old friends.

The telegram is signed by George Crystal and his son. Mr. Crystal and his family were residents of Dallas from about 1878 to 1884, he being clerk for J. D. Lee. Mr. Fenton being associated with him in the same capacity. Mrs. Crystal was a MacWilliams before marriage, living on the Wm. Howe place west of town. Her family have now all passed away except two brothers and a sister, residents of California. Mrs. Crystal was a lady of many accomplishments and admirable qualities and her passing will be sincerely regretted by many old time friends in this vicinity.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Grant, venerable and greatly respected residents of this city and widely known pioneers of Polk county, reached and passed Monday, and the rejoicing of their many friends, the sixtieth anniversary of their wedding life. In celebration of the event, an informal gathering of the children and friends of the aged couple gathered at their home on Church street, Sunday, where the time was pleasantly passed in receiving congratulations and relating reminiscences of their journey through life. A noteworthy fact in connection with the life story of these remarkable old people is that since the day they have been married they have not been separated more than three weeks at any one time. As a token of respect, the visitors presented them with a beautiful rug.

Mr. Grant is now 81 years old, and Mrs. Grant, whose maiden name was Josephine Williams, is 78. They were married in Clay county, Missouri, in 1851, when he was 21 and she only 16. In 1852 they came across the plains to Oregon, and took up their home near Bridgeport in this county, and lived their life there. The succeeding two years were spent in Falls City. They then removed to Dallas, which has since been their home.

Their three living children are all residents of this city. They are: J. M. Grant, sheriff of Polk county, D. J. and M. B. Grant. There are six grandchildren and two great grandchildren.
