The crops, consisting of corn, wheat and barley, look good. Threshing will begin in a few days and the hands work only eight hours a day, that being a state labor law and a good one.

Saturdays display a busy scene here; over 800 come to town that day, and the city has only a population of 4000 people, one-eighth of them colored people. Living is much cheaper here and wages just as good as in Oregon. Oregon may have Kansas beat for climate but that is all.

I took a trip to Kansas City today. It is 40 miles, and takes just 45 minutes, the trains all making fast time. Kansas City is a large city, and a great manufacturing center. This city boasts of one of the nicest parks in the U. S. A., and they have just cause to be proud of it. Any one with small means can prosper in this country, as land is very good and cheap too. ### The Armory Building.

According to a report from Captain W. L. Toose this morning prospects are now very bright for work starting at an early date on our new \$15,000 armory. The absence of Captain Toose at the Mexican line maneuvers caused some delay, and the military authorities were not at all satisfied with the depth of the sewer as they found it at the site purchased. City Engineer Morrison has evolved a plan for the obviating of the latter difficulty and Captain Toose is today submitting it to Adjutant General Finzer. The city has paid its proportion of the money necessary and the county will issue a warrant this week, so all financial difficulties have been fixed, and it is now up to the military board to go ahead.
