A DISTRICT LEAGUE.

Dallasites Go to Albany to Form Union Association.

Friday evening in his auto W. V. Fuller took to Albany U. S. Longhary, J. L. White and others. They went to meet with other delegates from the counties of the Willamette valley for the purpose of forming a district of Union League chapters. The delegates from Lincoln, Lane, Marion, Polk and Yamhill could be best collectively subserved. Temporary organization was effected by the election of F. H. Hooper, of Salem, as chairman, and D. A. Freeman, of Eugene, as secretary. Owing to some of the delegates not being present, the plan of the organization were not entirely perfected. First it is proposed to arrange a mammoth and first class exhibit of products of the six counties, to be shown at the state fair and then taken to the Omaha land show and other places where such would prove of advantage in advertising the valley. Other plans were also talked of, which will be definitely considered at the next meeting. That such an organization can be made to work for good is beyond question, and it is hoped to see every commercial body in the valley represented next Tuesday. Combined advertising work, on a larger scale than ever before attempted, is certain to bring many new home-seekers, and it will then be up to the individual counties to find them the location desired.
