### Service Hard to Obtain on Lady Living in Both Polk and Yamhill Counties.

Woman's ingenuity, coupled with the persuasive agency of a loaded musket in the hands of Mrs. M. J. Carter, wife of a prosperous rancher living three miles south of here, has created a barrier on the Carter farm through which G. U. Henderson, the sheriff of Yamhill county, and A. M. Fanning, the mayor of Sheridan, have been unable to penetrate. As a result, Mrs. Carter now stands master of a situation that promises to enmesh attorneys, real estate agents, bankers, court officials and county records in a labyrinthine legal tangle.

Mrs. Carter drove the mayor of Sheridan from her premises one day last week at the point of a shotgun, and a few days later, by a shrewd watchfulness, was able to blanket the efforts of the Yamhill county sheriff to serve a warrant for her arrest. The house of Carter stands within a few feet of the dividing line between Polk and Yamhill counties, and when Sheriff Henderson approached the back door, which opens to the vista of Yamhill county, he was met by the decorous parley of Mrs. Carter, who forebore to leave the security of that part of her home that lies within the county of Polk.

Disatisfied with the preliminary negotiations which Mrs. Carter made with the mayor and others for the sale of her land early last week, she came to a bank in Sheridan and secured the deed to the ranch, which was held in escrow by that bank. This is the prize now coveted by the mayor. A legal suit has been instituted by the prospective buyers, allocated by the sheriff to Yamhill county, where a breach of contract on the part of Mrs. Carter, but thus far she had declined to accept monetary offers to bind the transaction, and a declarator she will not until she is satisfied that there is no trickery connected with the transfer.

It is the object of the plaintiffs to bring suit in Yamhill county, where legal expenses will be minimized, due to the proximity of the county seat. If action is begun in Polk county, it will swing the stage of controversy to Dallas, the county seat of Polk county, which is more nearly inaccessible from Sheridan.

The convenient topography of the Carter farm, in that the boundary line between the two counties offers immediate exit from the province of the law on either side, is regarded as a stumbling block that will handicap seriously the prosecution of the suit by the plaintiffs.—Oregonian.
