Six leading Willamette Valley counties prepared for a permanent compact in a meeting at Albany last Tuesday night. Dinn, Benton, Marion, Polk and Lane gave their pledges to put up their best possible county exhibits at the state fair with a view to consolidating all of these into the Willamette Valley exhibit to be sent to five of the biggest land shows in the country this fall. Yamhill county was not represented at the meeting but will exhibit the organization. A. F. Hider, president of the Willamette Valley Exhibit association, will begin active preparations to send out those exhibits. Mr. Hider, Frank Meredith and D. C. Freeman compose ways and means committee for handling the exhibits. The distinctively valley exhibit will be sent to Omaha, October 20th; New York, November 3d, Chicago, November 18th, and to Knoxville and St. Paul later. W. H. Marwin, J. S. VanWinkle and J. C. Holbrook were appointed a committee on permanent organization. A pull together spirit was manifested at the meeting and the entire valley is expected now to come together with less selfish strife and as much zeal as any individual community would have manifested a few years ago.
