FOR A RAILROAD.

Commercial Club Wants Two More
Lines in Dallas.

A communication was read from a Polk county oil company, asking the cooperation of the club, and it was ordered placed on file.

An invitation was received to be present at a meeting of the Pacific coast states in the coliseum at the Omaha land show on October 25th. Filed.

A letter from the J. K. Aams by people was received regarding the suggestion of Edwin Jacobson for a Polk county prune label, recommending the same.

Edwin Jacobson stated that he had taken down the Polk county grain and grain exhibit at the state fair and packed the same in mouse tight boxes, and that they had been left in the Polk county booth, where they would be perfectly safe until the next fair.

On motion of U. S. Loughary, the secretary was instructed to notify members that no more lines would be remitted where they have violated the rules of the club in subscribing to various things without the sanction of the secret committee.

On motion of W. L. Soehren, the secretary was ordered to have cards printed stating that contributions could not be given without this sanction to be hung in each business house.

Secretary Tooe, on request of F. K. Hubbard, mayor of Falls City, brought up the matter of a railroad from there to the coast, claiming the road previously surveyed to be impracticable, the result being that logs would be shot down from the mountains to the river, leaving Falls City out in the cold.

Falls Cityites believe they have a practicable route onward, and that a road to the coast can be built at small cost, and through Mr. Tooe asked Dallas to co-operate with them in making a preliminary survey. The matter was

discussed pro and con, in all its phases, and on motion of Secretary Tooe a committee of three, consisting of U. S. Loughary, E. Jacobson and W. L. Tooe were appointed to draft resolutions for the information of the railroad commission regarding the inequalities of freight rates to Falls City, and aid those people in every way to get fair rates on the goods shipped in or out of that place.

Rev. Winter brought up a verbal report of the committee appointed to take up the matter of securing the \$25,000 endowment fund for Dallas college. Mr. Winter reported that the committee had been working a little on the quiet and were happy to report about \$8,000 so far subscribed. He suggested that the club designate a Dallas College Rally day, naming a committee of about 50 to work on that day, each in their own section as allotted to them. He proposed that, Saturday, November 4th, be made that day.

On motion of Tracy Staats the report of the committee was accepted, also the plan for Rally day as recommended by Rev. Winter.

W. L. Soehren moved that W. L. Tooe and Ed Jacobson be appointed to draft resolutions asking that the Oregon Electric continue their line to Dallas, and the Southern Pacific asking them to run their West Side train to Corvallis through Dallas. Carried with a whoop.

Secretary Staats made a report on the carnival, showing the total expenses to be \$812.65 and that there was a balance of \$82.60.
