Monmouth's New High School.

The new \$20,000 high school has just been accepted by the directors and school opened in it Monday. The grades have since September been accommodated in the normal building, while the high school pupils have been in the old Floyd building.

The new building which is one of the finest in the valley was designed by F. A. Long of Salem, while Weeter & Wood were the contractors. It was built of Willamina pressed brick. The building throughout is equipped with the hot air fan system which is regulated by the teacher in each room. On the ground floor are the play rooms. On the second floor are four large rooms, and are provided with broad high windows. The superintendent's office is also located on this floor and overlooks the spacious hall. —Journal.
