Patronize One Another for the Upbuilding of Town and County.

WHY NOT A PAPER MILL?

Government and other experts have now decided that spruce is not the only timber from which a good quality of paper can be made, but that the common hemlock and jack pine are available for the purpose. There are but few paper mills in the Northwest, principally for the reason that we were supposed to lack an abundant supply of the only timber that was the right thing for its manufacture, and by far the greater amount of paper used has been shipped from eastern establishments, making the cost considerably greater than it should be. The cost of paper is something that concerns nearly every business man, as we all use it in one shape or another. If, as the experts say, it can be manufactured from the plenitude of material right at our doors, it will prove a matter of interest to all, and instead of a few mills, there should be dozens engaged in working up the raw material, creating new industries and labor opportunities, while certainly to some extent lessening the cost to the consumer by the saving of the freight from the east. A saving of a quarter or half cent a pound would mean much to the newspapers of our state, who by their large consumption would be the principal ones affected, and all of us should work together to see that the new wood is utilized, if its value for the purpose is found as asserted by those supposed to know. Under these conditions the Itemizer can think of no more favorable location for a paper mill than Dallas. Situated as we are, right at the foot of the Coast Range with an independent line of railway penetrating the very heart of timber fastnesses, we are ideally located for such an establishment. We have the goods, and if they can make the paper, we see no reason why another industry, with large payroll, should not be added to those we already have. An industry of that kind could secure cheaper and much better power here than anywhere else that we know of in this section, and our shipping facilities for the finished article are much better than the average, Dallas being the natural hub of all this western valley, with easy and quick communication with both the metropolis and the state capital. In fact the advantages for the location of such a mill at this place are almost too many to attempt to enumerate in an editorial article, unless we wish to touch on nothing else this week, and we hope that such advantages and utilization of our pine and hemlock will work out to a successful conclusion.

REFUSED CREDIT NOW.
