UNCLE JOHNNY GONE.

Well Known Resident of Dallas Passes to Reward.

Although expected for some time, the news of the death, Friday night of Uncle Johnny Wiseman came as a sad blow to his many friends in this city, who during the 20 years of his residence among us have loved and respected him for his genial temperament and many noble qualities. He had been confined to his bed for some months, but it was hoped that he would again be able to combat the disease sapping away his strength and take his place once more among us.

John James Wiseman was born near Buffalo, New York, August 20, 1836. He moved with his parents when six years old to Waukegan, Illinois, where he made his home until the Rebellion, serving in the army until its close and the death of his wife in 1892. He had been in Nuncia, Michigan, where he conducted a store and dealt in timber. He arrived here in 1888, and for many years the Wiseman hardware store was one of our most successful businesses. Failing health and the death of his wife in 1902, caused him to retire from active business life and he has since devoted himself to his home.

Under the auspices of the Masonic body he was laid to rest Sunday afternoon, the sermon being preached by Rev. D. M. Metzger, and W. H. F. Manston, John Frank, Harry Gaynor, Carl McBea, A. L. Frazer and Fred LeMasieur acting as pallbearers.

Mr. Wiseman leaves a brother in Illinois, and two daughters, Mrs. Jessie Westover of this city, and Mrs. Emma Davidson, of Nuncia, Michigan.
