**MRS. FRAZER GONE.**  
One More Pioneer Passes to Her Reward for Labors on Earth.

In the death of Mrs. Elizabeth A. Frazer, familiarly and lovingly known as Aunt Amanda, which occurred at her home in this city, Friday, December 15th, there passed from our midst one of those noble pioneer women whose life was closely associated with the development of Polk county.

Elizabeth A. Campbell was born February 4th, 1838, in Morgan county, Ill. In 1842 the family moved to Davis county, Iowa, and in 1853 crossed the plains by ox team to Oregon, and settled on Salt Creek in this county. She was married July 31, 1856, to L. B. Frazer, and to them there were born thirteen children, seven sons and six daughters. Her husband and four children have passed on before. The living children are J. R. Frazer, Mrs. Vieta Neal and Mrs. Hattie Burnett, of Albany; Charles Frazer, of Twin Falls, Idaho; U. L. Frazer, of Vancouver, Wash.; Mrs. Pink Denny, of Ona, Ore.; Mrs. Carrie Holcomb, of Doty, Wash.; Mrs. Jessie Mulkey and Clay Frazer, of Dallas.

Besides her own children, Mrs. Frazer had twenty-two grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren, three brothers and three sisters—T. J., J. M., and W. G. Campbell, Mrs. S. F. Black and Mrs. O. A. Dashiell, of Dallas, and Mrs. C. E. Kennedy, of Palouse City, Wash., and a half-brother, John B. Campbell, of Wendling, Ore.

In her long and useful life, Mrs. Frazer witnessed wonderful changes from the embryo territory of Oregon to the great state, whose laws are models and are being copied by states a century older; from the ox team to the palace car, from the log cabin to the elegant mansion, and Dallas from a straggling village of a few small houses to a city of beautiful homes. She united with the church at Salt Creek, November 22, 1857, and ever lived a consistent christian life, kind and gentle by nature in all relations of life, as daughter, sister, wife, mother or friend; her life was a blessing to all who knew her, and those who knew her best loved her most.

The funeral services were held at her residence on Levens street, Elder W. A. Wood, minister of the Christian church of Monmouth, paid a beautiful tribute to her memory, after which she was laid to rest beside her husband and four children in the cemetery at Bethel. I. N. Mulkey spoke feelingly of her long and useful life in the church at Bethel. Her work on earth is done and well done, but her influence and memory will live long in the lives of those who knew her.

**MRS. MARGARET J. MARTIN.**  
Born in Polk County in 1845 and Believed to be the Oldest Native-Born Lady.

Mrs. Margaret J. Martin, a resident of Douglas county for the past 42 years and probably the oldest native born woman of Oregon, died at her home, 418 West Washington street, Roseburg, Wednesday night, December 13, at the age of 66 years. She was the wife of Howard M. Martin, a local real estate dealer.

Mrs. Martin had been an invalid from a complication of ailments for the past two years. She spent the winter of 1910 in southern California, but the change in climate failed to benefit her and her health continued to decline constantly until the end.

Mrs. Martin, whose maiden name was Taylor, was born in Polk county, Oregon, in 1845, the year in which her parents immigrated to this state. It is believed by her family that she is the oldest native-born woman, at least it never came to their attention that any other Oregon lady claimed such a distinction.

Mr. and Mrs. Martin, after their marriage in Polk county, moved to Douglas county in 1867. They first lived at Elkton, then at Wilbur, where their daughter died in 1888. Later they moved to Roseburg and remained there permanently. Besides her husband, Mrs. Martin leaves one son, Louis A. Martin, a nursery agent of this city; one sister, Mrs. Mary A. Baker, of Oakland, Oregon, and three brothers, Marion, Andrew and W. A. Taylor, all living in Marion county, Oregon. The first named brother has been here for several days past.

The funeral will be held from the residence tomorrow at 12 o'clock noon, with services conducted by Rev. W. H. Eaton, of the Baptist church. Interment will follow at 3 o'clock in the family burial plot at Wilbur—Roseburg Review.

**A PIONEER POLKITE.**

Mrs. Nancy M. Putnam, a pioneer of 1874, died Wednesday night at Independence at the age of 79 years.

Until two years ago Mrs. Putnam had resided at West Salem continuously since 1874, when she removed to Independence. In 1893 her husband, Newton Putnam, died.

She is survived by the following sons: W. P. Putnam, of Montana; J. H., of Fossie, Wheeler county; W. M., of Independence; Marion, of West Salem and J. B. Putnam, of this city.

Mrs. Putnam was universally beloved for her kind and charitable disposition.

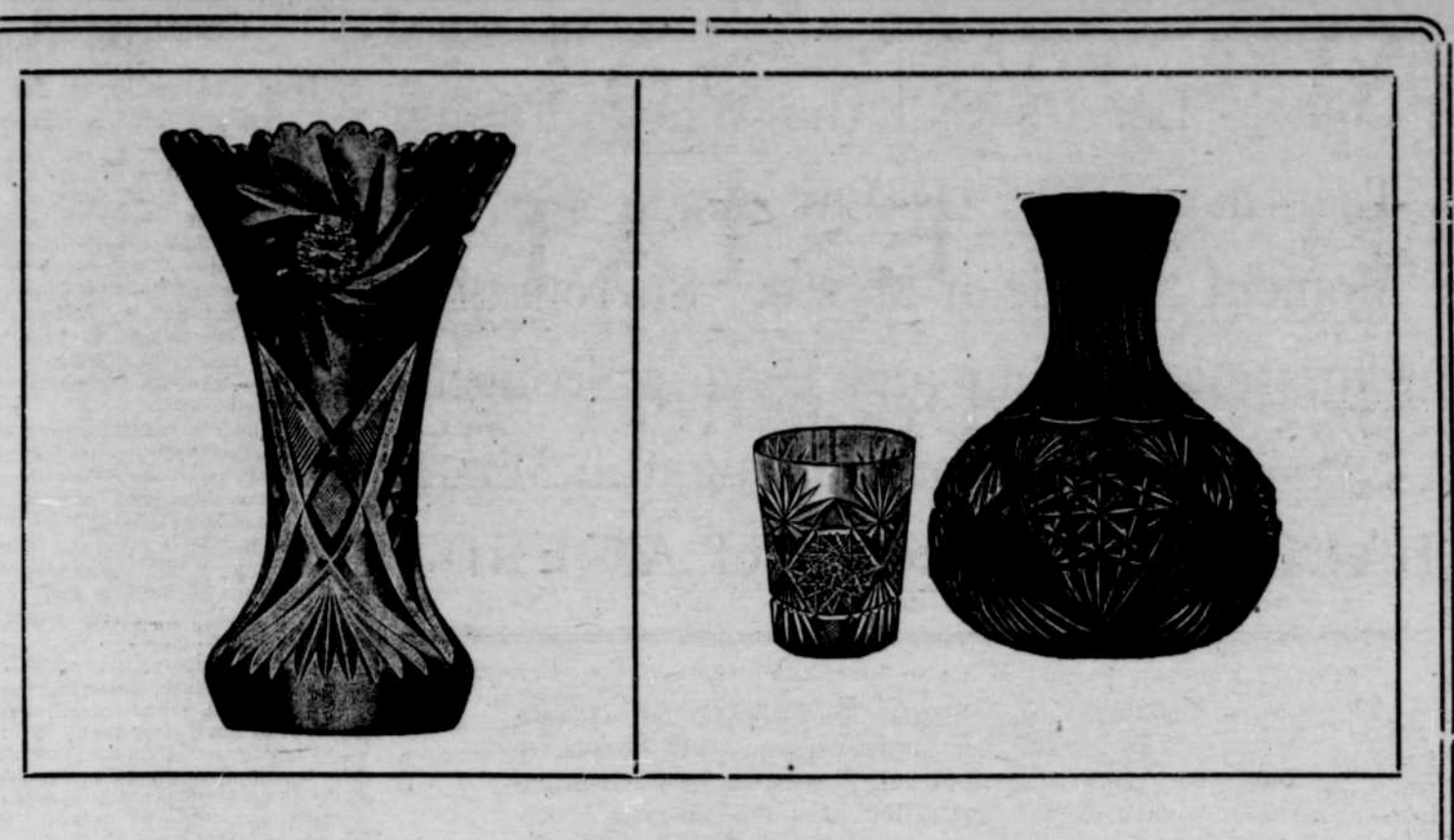
