WILLIAMS AT WHITE HOUSE.

Committeeman Confers With Hill's Political Situation.

Ralph E. Williams, Republican National committeeman for Oregon, after a conference Thursday with Mr. Hill, private secretary of the President, left for Chicago to attend a meeting of the sub-committee, which is to make arrangements for representation in the National convention. At the White House conference Mr. Williams gave Hill the benefit of such political information as came his way on his recent visit to New York. He was not disposed to talk for publication regarding what took place at the White House today. Mr. Williams will return to Washington in about a week for a further conference with the President and Mr. Hill, and then will leave for Oregon by the Southern route. Mrs. Williams accompanied him to Chicago.—Oregonian.

Dallas to Try Conclusions with Fast Corvallis Team.

On next Saturday evening, the basket ball fans of Dallas will have the opportunity of seeing the local Co. H. basket-ball team lock horns with their old time rivals, the Corvallis team. Of all games scheduled thus far this season, this game will undoubtedly prove the most interesting. Corvallis comes this year as strong as ever, and as determined to wrest victory from the local team.

"Skeeter" Swan, Cate, Bilyeu, the trio that have made basket ball famous in the Oregon Agricultural college and in Corvallis will be in the line-up. The men have been playing together for years, and have developed into a combination that is hard to beat. In addition to these men, Tripp, an O. A. C. star of last year, will be in the game for Corvallis. Thus far this season, Corvallis has not lost a game, and defeated the Philomath college team without having practiced once. They are in practice now, and come here fully prepared for a hard game.

There is not much that can be said of the Dallas boys that is not fully known to the sport-loving public of this city and county. During the past three weeks, the local team has been practicing rather irregularly owing to the goat show in the Armory, and injuries to several of the players. However, they are working hard now, and will be in the pink of condition on Saturday evening when the referees whistle blows for the opening of the game. COUNCIL MEETING.

Civic Improvement Organization Asks for Cleanliness on Streets and in Stores.

The council met in regular session last Monday evening, with all the councilmen and officers present except Mayor Craven. Councilmen Ayres called the meeting to order, but hardly succeeded in warming the chair before Mayor Craven appeared. Chairman Coad, of the street committee, reported a number of defective walks, also that J. G. and Henry Brown be given six months to remove their water pipes on Main street, also that the city vacate 20 feet on North side of Academy street, between Main and Church. Also a catch basin at corner of Jefferson and Clay at Christian church. Also a fire hydrant at the Dashiell corner. Also alley ways from Oak to Washington. Report accepted and so ordered.

Mrs. Ella J. Metzger appeared as a representative of the ladies' civic improvement club, and asked the aid of the council in their work. She stated that at their recent meeting the ladies had decided to begin with little things, and had decided to ask first for an ordinance prohibiting either expectorating or spitting on the sidewalks, and that a lady inspector be named by the council to supervise the cleanliness of markets and groceries, this officer to serve without pay, but to have full authority to see that more sanitary means are employed by our merchants to keep their establishments clean and wholesome for the health and taste of their patrons.

Ayres recommended a catch basin at Ray's corner. Referred to the finance committee with power to act. Campbell moved that the matter of the McBe street dedication be laid over and the city engineer be instructed to make lines to see whether such will conform to the center of the street. Carried.

Fuller moved that the waste paper boxes be removed from the vicinity of the confectionery stores, as they were continually filled with heterogeneous matter against the health of the city. Carried.

Staats reported that data had been received of the proposed Carnegie library, and as soon as possible the committee would get together and select plans from those proposed.

Attorney Toose suggested the substitution of two cluster lights at the armory, one on Railroad street and one on Mill, in place of the arc light recently ordered at that intersection, stating that if the council would pay for one the state would pay for the other. Referred to the fire and water committee.

A communication was received from Louis C. Kelsay by Mayor Craven, making a proposition as consulting engineer for a new sanitary and storm sewerage system. He agreed to furnish full plans, and see that all work was lived up to in specifications for 2 per cent of the total cost of construction. The city engineer was to have actual local supervision without cost to Mr. Kelsay, and he to give street levels. The proposition was ordered placed on file.

City Auditor Gregory stated that the mayor had returned the ordinance providing for placing the marshal on a flat salary without his approval, together with some valid reasons for such non approval. The question being shall the veto be sustained, which evoked considerable discussion, all the council being in favor of putting the marshal on a flat salary, but desiring to be certain that they had an ordinance perfectly legal and without possible holes, the action of the mayor was upheld.

An ordinance providing for the macadam street and curb work for 1912 was read second time and on motion of Staats laid over to next Monday night, and on motion of Coad the matter of what blocks are to be improved was left to the street committee.

On motion of Coad the ordinance committee was instructed to bring in an ordinance covering the improvements suggested by the representative from the ladies' civic club. Mr. Bowles appeared before the council regarding the faulty construction of a sewer across the property belonging to the Whitehorn heirs, same causing a stoppage and serious detriment to the health of the people being served. On motion of Campbell the mat-

ter was left to the fire and water committee with power to act, after Mr. Bowles has the sewer opened.

On motion of Ayres a committee consisting of Campbell & Fenton was named to confer with the Odd Fellows regarding the letting of the upper story of the city hall to that association for a term of years.

On motion of Ayres it was ordered that a warrant be drawn on sewer fund for \$90 to pay interest on sewer outlet bonds.

On motion of Fuller the matter of the plans of the Ash street sewer, already partially drawn by Mr. Morrison, was left in the hands of the finance committee to arrange with him for their completion. On motion of Fenton the matter of laterals for such was left to the same and the street committee.

On motion of Fenton the council adjourned to next Monday evening.
