Patronize One Another for the Uplifting of Town and County.

Speaking to a man the other day regarding the proposed cement factory, he made the remark, "What do you want of a factory? Dallas is large enough now. It would just mean more new buildings, better streets and more taxes." We are sorry to acknowledge that Dallas has remaining any of these so minded people, but they have and we guess other towns are afflicted the same way: People who have what they consider enough means to eke out a miserable existence of their own, content to get their little revenues and hoard them away, but never to spend one dollar for the good of the town, either in growth or otherwise. Men to whom pride of development is an unknown quality, a thing to be shunned as the very devil, forsooth because it might cost them a dime. Men who have no spirit of fraternalism about them, who look askance at every brother who may be able to get a few dollars ahead, and call him a fool if he invest in a proposition that will make his town develop, taking a chance with others to see that it does grow, knowing that as it does so he is offered better chances to make more dollars quickly and with the added pride of creation or assisting in such. The average progressive citizen can hardly grasp the workings of the mind of such a man as we first mentioned, but they do inhabit every community, to its detriment many times, when the entire pull of an entirely united people is needed to secure something good for a place. The sooner a town is rid of this class of people the better for it, but many times you have to wait for them to die to get rid of them. Dallas will get her cement factory despite the knockers.

Our commercial club should evince no backwardness in financially assisting our poultry association. The last chicken show was an eye opener as to what can be done in this line, and showed conclusively that our county is rapidly coming to the front as a chicken producing one. We are materially assisting in the aim to keep up with the input of our state's residents, but what has so far been accomplished is but a drop in the bucket, and we can have every small land holder raising all the fowls he wants to and then not suffer any glut of the market on any appreciable diminution of the present prices. Until the output exceeds the demand, there will be no lower prices, and there is money to be made by any one that cares to enter the business and give it the time and attention that it needs and must have to bring the results.

Patterning after the system of the republican party, our Teddy now gets in and steals our ideas regarding the woman suffrage question, coming out this week in an editorial in the Outlook, advocating leaving the matter to a vote of the women themselves. He probably voices better ideas on the subject than we had formulated, but the gist of the matter remains the same. The main question in this matter is whether the women of any state really want suffrage. The voices of a few blatant female orators should not be taken for the desires of femininity itself, and the latter is not sufficiently strong in Oregon as yet to make anything but a farce of the question.
