COUNCIL MEETING.
Lots of Bids in for the Proposed Clay Street Sewer.
Council met in adjourned session last Monday evening with Mayor Craven in the chair, and all the officers and councilmen present, and a number of outsiders from Portland.
City Engineer Morrison made an amended report on the Nunn hill, and that a 9 cent grade, instead of the 7 heretofore asked, would cost \$600. Mr. Fenton thought the property owners could raise that amount.
Casper reported that he had interviewed R. P. Boise and the renters in his places, and that he would not object to sluicing off the dirt at the crusher at the proper time.
Eight o'clock having arrived the auditor proceeded to open and read the bids received for putting in the Ash street sewer. The following bids were offered: Dennis & Christiansen, \$6,475 00

E. W. Geiger Construction Co., of Salem, 14-inch curbing at 36-1-2 cents per linear foot.
W. L. Soehren and N. Anderson 22 1-2 cents a foot.
Kibbe, Welton & Co 44 cents a linear foot.
John Olin, 32 cents a linear foot.
U. S. Grant 10 cents a foot for his own lot.
A. H. Hogan and J. D. Hubbard 35 1-4 cents a foot.
John E. Martin offered a bid of \$2.50 a cord for fir wood delivered at the city quarry.
Ayes moved that the acceptance or rejection of both curb and sewer bids be deferred to the next regular meeting. Carried, and on motion of Casper the auditor was ordered to compile the bids.
On motion of Fenton the wood bid was also laid over.
A report was made from the committee on cutoff nozzle and smoke protectors, the samples being present, and on motion of Fenton the nozzle was ordered purchased at a cost of \$30 and the protectors at \$2 each.
Campbell brought up the matter of a light on Clay and Jefferson, and the matter was referred to the fire and water committee for investigation.
Mrs. Metzger, representing the Woman's Civic club, stated that the 20th of April had been set aside by the state federation of such clubs as Cleanup day and asked that the same date be approved by the council and that some financial aid be given, especially in the way of providing boxes in which to deposit the refuse and to haul it away. Mrs. J. R. Craven and Mrs. Tracy Staats accompanied Mrs. Metzger, but she said she was to do all the talking and she did. The council assured the ladies that they were perfectly willing to help in the matter, provided they could secure a dumping ground. On motion of Coad a committee of Coad, Fenton and Casper were appointed to see the truckmen and make arrangements.
An agreement was read from those interested guaranteeing \$400 for the cutting down of the Nunn hill. They asked that this be applied to the north side of the hill, all they expect to be able to cut down this year, and that the city rock it after cutting. On motion of Staats it was given over to the street committee with power to act.
