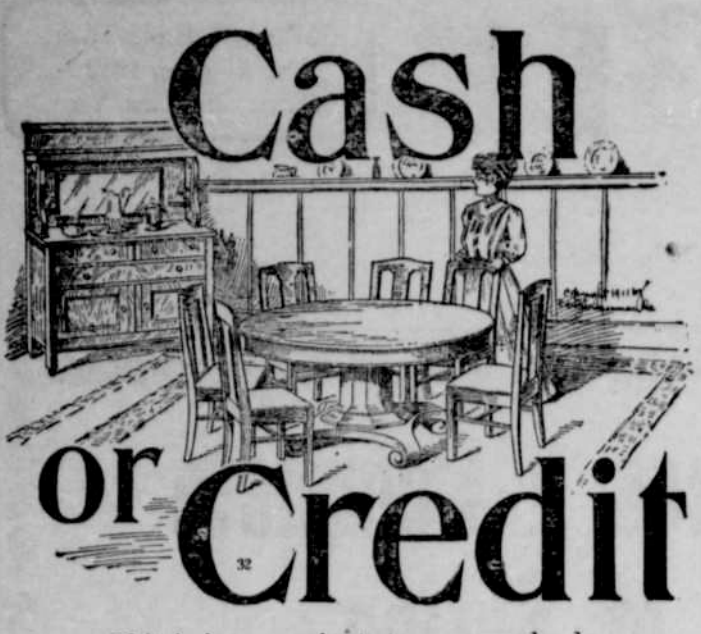

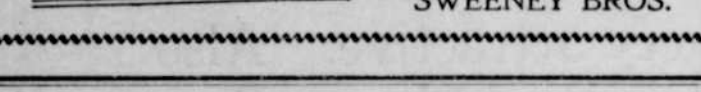

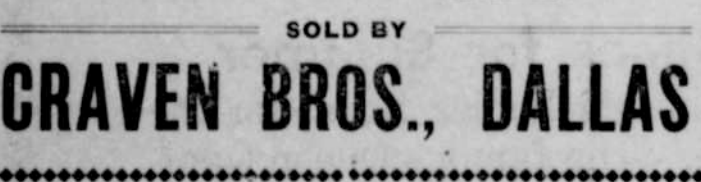

ELECTION NOTES.

DEMOCRATIC

Mark Holmes got the highest number of votes in this county of any of the candidates for the national democratic convention, he receiving 339 to A. S. Bennett's 53, W. R. King's 32 and Victor P. Moses 31.

D. M. Watson got 177 votes for presidential elector, John M. Wall 111, Hugh McLane 133, Will M. Peterson 69 and F. C. Whitten 41.

For railroad commissioner Thos Campbell, E. C. Kirkpatrick and W. D. Henry got one vote each. For joint representative from Lincoln and Polk Thos. Brunk got 29 votes, J. G. VanOrsdel 24, L. D. Brown 1, N. L. Butler 2 and Frank Newton 2.

Two democrats voted for John Teal for county judge.

Tracy Staats got 511 votes for treasurer.

For assessor Harry Seymour got 24 votes and W. I. Ford 21, in addition to those noted in our table for F. E. Meyer and Finley Edgar.

For school superintendent Fred Crowley got 56 votes, Eldon Haley 1, Prof. Dunton 2, and V. P. Fishback 2.

For surveyor F. M. Suver got 539 votes, Luther Ground 1 and Ben Beazley 1.

For justice of district 5 R. W. Baker got 123 votes.

For constable of district 4 Jesse Beazley got 86 votes.

George E. Chamberlain got 99 votes for vice president, seven other parties receiving a few votes each.

There were 21 people voted for as candidates for representatives in Congress, Robert C. Smith leading the bunch with 10 votes, John Orr got a vote for sheriff and so did P. Q. Peterson, R. J. Taylor and John Ford.

For coroner R. L. Chapman got 12 votes, Dr. Staats 10, and Dr. McCallon, Boots Kersey, Bill White and O. D. Butler 1 each.

For assessor W. R. Allen got 2 votes, W. A. Ayres 3, Dr. Staats 4 and E. L. Ketchum 1.

Not many votes for justice or constable were recorded, and voters seem to have as a rule failed to write in for any candidate where names were not printed on the ballot.

REPUBLICAN

The delegate to the republican convention receiving the highest vote was Little Doc Smith, he getting 315, C. W. Acheson coming next with 238.

For vice president the republicans wanted C. W. Fulton, giving him 29 votes, Burch 23, LaFollette 5, Cummings 4, McKinley Mitchell 4 and Taft 3.

For presidential electors M. J. McMahon got 921 votes, E. V. Carter 3, C. A. Johns 1, McKinley Mitchell 2, G. L. Hawkins 1 and L. M. Lipper 1.

W. C. Hawley got 1284 votes for representative in Congress.

For justice of the supreme court, Robert Bakin got 1179 votes to Henry McGinn's 1.

For dairy and food commissioner W. I. Cottel got 290 votes, A. T. Edwards, 135, A. A. Lee 347, John D. Mickle 502.

For railroad commissioner, T. K. Campbell got 1177 votes to W. R. Hinshaw's 1.

J. M. Grant got 19 votes for sheriff and Asa B. Robinson got 1 for clerk.

Tracy Staats got 18 votes for assessor, Wm. Kiddell 9, and R. H. Knox 2.

Fred Crowley got 6 republican votes for assessor.

For school superintendent H. C. Seymour got 1232 votes, W. Ford 3, and Prof. Dunton 2.
