Will Open Here for One Day Engagement Thursday, May 30.

"Now, just one thing more, Sells-Floto circus will parade on the morning of the first performance at 10:30 o'clock. Our patrons can see for themselves just what we have to offer, and those who do not think that we are giving full values in every way, or have endeavored to make them the victims of misplaced confidence, had better stay away from the performances."
