Adjustable Electric Light Socket Factory Asks for a Site.

A goodly number of the commercial club turned out last evening on the call of the president to receive a proposition from Mr. C. W. Minnich regarding the purchase for him by the club of a site for his adjustable electric light socket factory.

Mr. Minnich stated that he desired a decided site, and he approved of Mr. J. G. VanOrsdal's land at the foot of Jefferson street at a price of \$400. On investigation it was found that this property was not on the market—this not being learned until the club was in session. The matter was referred to the manufacturers committee to act with Mr. Minnich in securing another site.

Secretary Toozie moved that the club expend not more than \$300 for the purchase of this site. Considerable discussion ensued on the motion, but it finally passed by a unanimous vote.

Secretary Toozie moved that Dallas have a Fourth of July celebration. This brought on more discussion, pro and con, and the matter was finally decided contrawise, the club deciding that we now had all the amusements contracted for that we could pay for. However, the club decided such a proposition would receive their hearty endorsement provided the citizens took the matter up and carried it through, and recommended that the mayor call a mass meeting for initiating such a movement. The mayor named next Tuesday evening as the date for the proposed mass meeting at the county court room.
