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NICE DAY.

Decoration Day Great Success in Every Respect.

Early Thursday morning the people from all over the country began to arrive in Dallas to assist in a fitting observance of memorial day, and pay a last tribute to the honor of those who had fought, bled and died for the salvation of our country. By the time time announced for the parade the sidewalks were jammed with a mass of gaily garbed humanity, both on the main and side avenues, and the streets were filled with a heterogeneous mass of autos, carriages, buggies, wagons, bicycles, etc., containing other hundreds bent on the same errand—waiting to see what Dallas could turn out in behalf of the occasion.

Promptly at 9:30 Marshal H. L. Fenton and Edwin Jacobson got the different regiments of their parade found up, the band, veterans and militia forming on Main and marching to the high school, where they joined the children and counter-marched up Main to Washington, thence to Jefferson, thence to Mill, thence to court, thence to Railroad, and to the army. Captain Toole and some 30 men of Company G, led the procession, followed by the G. A. R. to the number of an even dozen—there were 13 last year—and then came the school children, numbering about 600, with the smallest in the van. Auto containing the officers and speakers of the day followed, making a procession over four blocks in length, pleasing to the eye and particularly indicative of how Dallas has grown in the last few years.

At the army the program was gone through with as published in last week's paper, all parties concerned acquitting themselves with credit, and furnishing a program most interesting to all who could crowd into the large structure.

THE ARTISAN PICNIC.

Uncle Sol could not have devised a more perfect day for a picnic than he accorded the Artisans on last Saturday. The day, while warm, was not uncomfortably so, just sufficient to make the people hanker for the delights of a picnic—lemonade, ice cream, and other iced drinks. By the time U. S. Grant's band was ready to give its half hour concert on the court house square, the streets were filled with eager pleasure seekers. The band rendered some fine music for half an hour, and a burro gave a thrilling exhibition of high wire acting. Then the parade formed at the Woodman hall and headed by the float award committee came down Main street, where the thousands of spectators gazing in delight and awe wonder at the numerous unique attractions, chief of which was the Artisan goat, a work of transformation worked on a burro by Norman Hayes, the scenic artist. It would take too much space to specially mention each float and section of the parade, so we will only say that it exceeded expectations and was a credit to the promoters, as was the entire picnic.

At the park the program as given was carried out in an admirable manner, and highly esteemed by those present.

GRANGE PICNIC.

A Big Day Promised at Oak Grove Next Saturday.

According to their posters the grangers of Polk county are planning for one of the most alluring picnics of the season at Oak Grove on next Saturday, and they anticipate an even larger crowd than they are generally favored with at this popular annual gathering. The music will be furnished by the famous Chemawa band, and the "eats" will be under the control of the proprietor of the Kandy Kitchen of Salem. The grange will be the leader in furnishing the morning literary program, and it will be one well worth hearing. Chemawa and Rieckrell will play ball in the afternoon, and there will be other sports of all kinds with appropriate prizes. If you desire a good time, be certain to attend.

On motion of Staats a warrant was ordered drawn on the library fund for \$100 in favor of the free library.

On motion of Coad the proposition of the Road Oiling company was accepted, and they were ordered to begin work at once.

Bids for the free library were now opened and the bid of Holmes & Grant for \$8180 was the only one received. The bid of \$1450 for heating was put in by Guy Bros. and one of \$1295 by Rodger Plumbing Co., of Salem. This evoked considerable discussion as the amount exceeded the amount offered by Carnegie would after the architect's fees were paid and the building completely furnished.

On motion of Fenton the bids were all rejected and the auditor instructed to readvertise. Considerable discussion here arose as to the value of hot water and steam heating plants, and considerable animosity developed against hot water, as it had not proven satisfactory in either the armory or the Williams building, and on motion of Fenton bids were ordered asked for in both steam and hot water, the first named being considerable cheaper to install. The architects and committee decided to get together at once and see if some reductions could not be made in the specifications.

An ordinance for the extermination of thistles, China lettuce and other noxious weeds was read first time.

An ordinance for the macadamization of the west end of Clay street was read second time and passed.

On motion of Ayres the ordinance committee was instructed to bring in a new license ordinance, especially covering circus, costing the city for the recent circus more than they got out of it.

Ayres brought up the dangerous condition of the Jap restaurant regarding a defective flue, and the marshal was instructed to see that the same was abated.

The mayor brought up the matter of the appointment of a park board. On motion of Fenton the mayor was instructed to appoint a board of three, outside of the council, as such board, them members to serve without pay and to attend to the upkeep of the city park.

On motion of Coad the finance committee was instructed to look after certain deeds coming to the city.

COUNCIL MEETING.

Bids Rejected on Free Library—Will be Readvertised.

Council met in regular session last Monday evening with Mayor Craven in the chair and all the councilmen and officers present except Councilman Barham.

Ayres reported some bad side walk on J. W. Crider's property.

Coad reported that a grade for the east end of Academy street would have to be established by ordinance.

On motion of Fenton the auditor was authorized to notify property owners of the contemplated change.

Fenton recommended the repair of walks along Dornisfe, Lynn and Brown properties, and a motion to that effect carried.

Fenton reported the Nunn hall as ready for rock.

The officers' reports for the last quarter were read and referred to the finance committee.
