

NORMAL WORK BROADENED

Monmouth Will Install Domestic Science Department.

Beginning with the Fall semester next September the Monmouth Normal School will enlarge its courses to include a domestic science department. An art department also will be installed. This was decided yesterday by the Board of Regents upon recommendation of the president. The courses are designed to fit instructors to teach such subjects in the public schools.

The board also decided to raise the minimum entrance requirements, from the completion of the ninth grade, or its equivalent, to the completion of the tenth grade, or its equivalent. The

change will be made at the beginning of the Fall semester, September, 1913. The resignation of Miss Olive Louise Davis, fifth and sixth grade critic, was accepted, and Miss Jessie Todd was elected in her place.

Many students have already arrived for the Summer school, and many more are expected Monday. The Summer school, which begins next Monday, will offer regular normal work, with the regular normal teachers.—Oregonian.

COUNCIL MEETING.

Several Resolutions Passed and Ordinances Read.

The city council met in adjourned session last Monday evening with all present except Campbell.

Staats reported the library committee had accepted the bids of Holmes & Grant and Guy Bros. and recommended that another location be found.

The bill of Dennis & Christiansen for 208 feet of sewer pipe, \$148.40, was on motion of Ayres allowed.

And ordinance amending the present license law was read first time. This ordinance simply raises the license on circuses from \$10 a day to \$25.

One time for the hearing on the Ash street sewer having arrived and no objections appearing the same was on motion of Fenton ordered closed.

A resolution providing for the entering in the docket of city liens of the cost as individually assessed for the Ash street sewer was read and passed.

On motion of Coad the hearing was closed on the establishment of certain street grades and the ordinance postponed to the next meeting.

The matter of furnishing crushed rock or clear gravel for cement walks was left with the street committee with power to act.

The matter then came up of fixing the site for the free library. Fenton advocated another site than the present one owned by the council. McEee thought the present site the best one that could be secured. Coad favored a new location, after having figured on the cost of moving, and the other costs that would accrue. Fenton favored a special election for the purpose of paying for a site. Ayres favored the present site and did not think it best to go somewhere else and pay several times what it would cost where it was first projected. The matter was laid over until Tuesday evening.

An hour was here put in by the council on the question of acceptance of the Ash street sewer, some of the council considering it a better job than they had ever received before, but others thought all dirt should be more settled than it was, and the matter was laid over until Tuesday evening.
