Many New Members Added to Club's List of Workers.

The Dallas Commercial club met in regular session last evening at 8:30, with President Foster in the chair, and a goodly attendance of members present, regardless of the extremely sultry evening.

On motion of A. B. Mair J. F. Mesuli was appointed secretary pro tem to take the place of W. L. Tooze absent at Newport.

W. V. Fuller, of the finance committee reported some expected contributors as not interviewed as yet.

The following new names were proposed and elected to membership: G. L. Hawkins, Robbie & Catherwood, J. C. Rickli, M. B. Young, Dallas City Bank, Dallas Meat Co., Flora McCallon, Johnston Electrical Co., Dallas National Bank, Holman & Boydston, Dallas Lumber & Logging Co., Holmes & Grant.

The matter of securing seats for spectators at the band concerts on Saturday nights was referred to the amusement committee with power to act.
