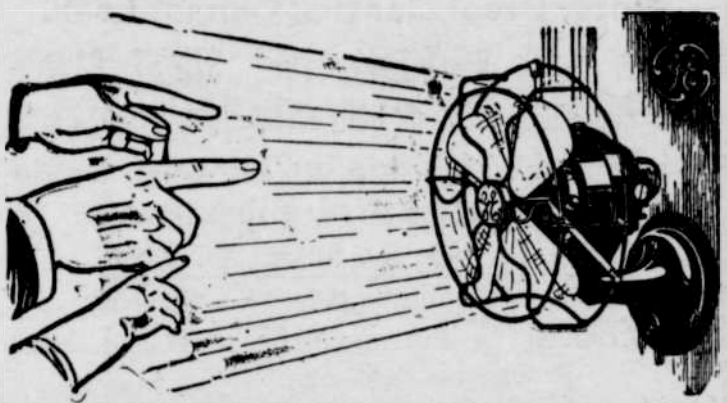

The Dallas Itemizer wants to know why the Review does not laud Bryan as some democratic editors are doing. We'll tell you, Bro. Fiske. Bryan had promised to support Clarke, but did not intend to do so. He went to Baltimore, we think, with the intention of forcing his own nomination, but when defeated for temporary chairman, this became impossible. Then he got sulky. Clarke was clearly the choice of the convention, receiving a decisive majority, and he would have been nominated had not Bryan, abandoning all sense of gratitude, accomplished the Missouri's defeat by what Mr. Clarke says were vile, malicious and untruthful insinuations against the speaker while the latter was attending to his duties at Washington and could not be present to refute them. If this is what constitutes a great party leader and patriot, then we guess Bryan is it.

The Review certainly views Bryan's actions at the convention with a jaundiced eye, one entirely different from that used by the majority of us. Bryan went to Baltimore with a fixed purpose, and that purpose was not his own advancement, but the advancement of his party in that they follow out the principles he has advocated for these many years. As a heroic leader of those principles it made no difference in his mind whether friend or foe tried to nullify the work of getting them through. If Clarke saw fit to ally himself with the bosses, he was digging his own grave, and Bryan as a conscientious leader could do nothing else but drop him, and stand for a man who would not accept tainted votes or money in the strife for right. To our mind Bryan was the noblest Roman of them all, and notwithstanding the Review's aspersions will continue to be honored for the stamina he exhibited at Baltimore in turning down the plutocrats who in Clark thought they had a willing and plastic henchman, one who if nominated, would work at their behest, and give them a string on the government that would prove as detrimental to right and justice as it is in the present incumbent.

**PLATFORMS AND HEALTH SERVICE.**

The framers of the Platform of the Republican National Convention did not see fit to make any definite declaration on the subject of a national Bureau or Department of Health. For this omission there are two possible explanations. Either they do not consider the subject of sufficient importance to be worthy of mention or they feared the antagonism of the interests and sects which, either through selfishness or ignorance, have opposed this measure. On the contrary, the framers of the platform for the Democratic party placed in it a strong and comprehensive endorsement of a national health service. The plank is a straightforward endorse-

ment of the principles of the present Owen bill. It reads:  
"We reaffirm our previous declarations advocating the union and strengthening of the various governmental agencies relating to pure foods, quarantine, vital statistics and human health. Thus united and administered without partiality to our discrimination against any school of medicine or system of healing they would constitute a single health service, not subordinated to any commercial or financial interests, but devoted exclusively to the conservation of human life and efficiency. Moreover, this health service should cooperate with the health agencies of our various states and cities without interference with their prerogatives or with the freedom of individuals to employ such medical or hygienic aid as they may see fit."

The plank in the Democratic platform evidently meets the approval of the Journal of the American Medical Association. In a recent issue it says, commenting on this statement: "There is nothing vague about this; it is concise and straightforward with no attempt at ambiguity."

Commercial bodies of the state are showing an interest in the collection of Oregon exhibits to be shown this winter at the land shows of the middle west. In response to a call sent out by Manager Chapman of the Oregon Development league, many outside societies have been heard from, each promising to collect samples of the best products grown there this season and it seems a good collection is assured. No locality should allow itself to be unrepresented.

Dallas is probably the only town of her size in Oregon that does not print her ordinances as passed in her town papers. This is economy without doubt, but is it giving her citizens the knowledge they are entitled to of the laws that govern them?

We are thankful to the many friends all over Polk county who on last Saturday tendered us their congratulations, and wished us many more years at the helm of the Itemizer fighting for the right and the advancement of the county.
