GIVE THE FLOWERS NOW.

Flowers make beautiful the casket that holds the re-
mains of the dead, but while it is right and proper to
place them there, they do no good for the dead. Their
incense and their beauty is for the living alone. It is
only as a tribute to the memory of the one that is gone
that they are laid there, because "for the dead we can
do no offices." The words of praise spoken in tender
tones in memory of the departed fall upon deaf
and heedless ears. Knowing this, we wait until the broth-
er has passed on before we bring him sweet flowers and
appreciative words. It is after he can no longer enjoy
the one or be pleased with the other that we bring our
gifts. How much better would it be if we should pre-
sent the flowers and speak the words of praise and ap-
preciation while yet he is living among us. How much
better that we appreciate his deeds and his words than
to show that appreciation to others after he is gone. Let
us scatter the flowers and speak the words while yet the
brother or the sister is with us, and not leave the task
of love to be performed when the eyes and ears are
closed to things of earth.

Do not gibe at your real estate men and call them
grifters, as we heard a man doing the other day. Taken
collectively there is no other class of your citizen-
ship that is doing more to build up your towns and coun-
ty, and, as a rule, they are making less out of their
business than any other class. They are not grifters in
any sense of the word, but all are boosters for the
common good, both the residents and the newcomers.
We will guarantee that a newcomer who comes to any
of them and states plainly what he desires will be served
to the best of their ability, and perfectly suited in the
matter of a purchase, if it is within their power to do so.
None of them are trying to sell land above what is its
actual value for the purpose that settlers may desire to
engage in, and if those who have land to sell would act
as fairly and honorably by the real estate agents as the
agents do by their prospective customers, there would
hardly ever be any occasion for the implied charge of
sharp practice.

In our opinion Mr. Roosevelt is not meeting, nor will
he meet, with the success he anticipated in the organiza-
tion of a third party. While we are not upholding the
mistakes made by Mr. Taft, and do not think him the
right man to govern this great nation of ours, yet we
cannot see in Roosevelt any betterment of conditions as
they would arise. Many of us remember just as serious
mistakes made by the latter man during his incumben-
cy of the office, in his endeavor to hold fast the vote of
certain classes. One of these mistakes was the giving
away of fifty million dollars of the people's money for
the purchase of the Philippines, after we had as a na-
tion acquired it by conquest. The giving of that am-
ount of money was a bribe, pure and simple, and was
intended only as a benefit to the party in power. There
are other mistakes, if we leniently call them so, that are
bound to confront Mr. Roosevelt before he gets through
with this third party business.

The Itemizer expects to see next spring a great de-
mand arise from all over the county for the oiling of
county roads, and our county court in its next levy
should provide for such a contingency. Experience in
Dallas has already proven the vast advantage to travel-
ers of such a step, and we hope next year to have trav-

PROHI TICKET.

Convention Held at Court House on
Last Friday.

The meeting was called to order
by Organizer David H. Gill
and the following temporary of-
ficers of the convention were
elected: Chairman, D. M. Metz-
ger; Vice-chairman, T. D. Phil-
lips; Secretary, D. G. Rempel.
At this time David H. Gill gave
a short talk on the plans for the
county work and also the things
that should come before the con-
vention. Then Prof. Metzger
gave a very helpful talk on the
failure of county option in the
county and said we must start
and build the party from the
ground up in order to make pro-
hibition a success.

The following committees were
then appointed: Credentials and
permanent organization, D. G.
Rempel, J. Rhodabarger, O. E.
Dennis; Resolutions and platform
C. M. Travis, T. D. Phillips,
J. Arnold; Nominations, H. H.
Dunkleberger, A. G. Rempel, J.
Rhodabarger. The convention
then adjourned for the morning
session and the committees then
took up their work.

At 1:30 p. m. the convention
again took up its work and the
committee on credentials and or-
ganization brought in their re-
port. As it was just a mass con-
vention all party prohibitionists
and voters intending to indenti-
fy themselves with the Prohibi-
tion party were seated as dele-
gates. The temporary organiza-
tion was made permanent and
the convention then elected the
county officers for the year and
the committee from the pre-

reall precinct No. 6, J. Itay
Fawk, Rickreall, South Indepen-
dence precinct No. 7, Isaac R.
Gillman, Independence; South
Monmouth precinct No. 8, W. A.
Gueffroy, Monmouth; Buena
Vista precinct No. 9, Joseph K.
Neel, Buena Vista; Sulzer pre-
cinct No. 10, vacant; Luckiamute
precinct No. 11, Henry J. Peavy,
Airlie; Bridgeport precinct, No.
12, Edward E. Lee, Dallas;
South-east Dallas precinct, No.
13, J. F. Holman, Dallas; McCoy

Buell precinct No. 24, vacant.

The committee on resolutions
and platform brought in their re-
port and was adopted as follows:

The Prohibition party of Polk
county, Oregon in convention as-
sembled in Dallas on July 26,
1912—Hereby resolve, that we
give our hearty endorsement to
the state and national platform
of the prohibition party and can-
didates nominated by the conven-
tions of the party, and pledge
heartily support to the "Out to
Win" campaign of 1912 for na-
tion, state, district and local of-
fices.

We invite the co-operation of
all citizens who believe in the
destruction of the liquor traffic
and the enactment of progressive
measures, and call attention to a
fact in this county, the number
of votes cast for the prohibition
amendment in 1910 would be
more than sufficient to elect
every candidate on our county
ticket.

The automobile campaign was
left to the county executive com-
mittee and the organizer to make
definite plans for, with a tenta-
tive route as follows: West Sal-
em 8:00 a. m., McCoy 9:30 a.
m., Ballston 10:45 a. m., Dallas
12:30 p. m., Monmouth 2:30 p.
m., Independence 3:30 p. m.,
Falls City 8:00 p. m., all on Aug-
ust 19th and 20th. Airlie and
Buena Vista will be visited in
the forenoon.

The candidates for some of
the county offices and O. A.
Stillman, of Salem, candidate for
congress from the first district
and B. Lee Paget, of Portland,
candidate for United States Sen-
ator, will accompany the auto
and give speeches at each of the
points. This is the first time
that the prohibitionists have ever
put up an automobile campaign,
but they are in an "Out to win"
campaign this year and people
are beginning to realize that the
prohibition party are winning
and they are joining the water
wagon brigade.

The nominating committee
then brought in their report and

the following candidates were
nominated: Representative,
Chester P. Gates, Dallas; County
Judge, Peter Kurre, Indepen-
dence; Commissioner, O. E. Den-
nis, Dallas; Sheriff, J. Ray Fawk,
Rickreall; Assessor, A. G. Remp-
el, Dallas; Clerk, H. H. Dunkle-
berger, Dallas; School Superin-
tendent, J. J. Arnold, from
Rogue River Valley school dis-
trict.

As this was also a joint repre-
sentative convention and the
candidate who had been nomi-
nated before had declined to ac-
cept the nomination, B. C.
Black, of Newport was nomi-
nated. The convention, both coun-
ty and joint representative, vot-
ed to empower the county execu-
tive committee of Polk county to
fill all vacancies occurring by
death or resignation of the coun-
ty nominees or the nominee for
joint representative.

The minutes of the convention
were adopted and the convention
then adjourned.

In the evening O. A. Stillman,
candidate for Congress from the
first district gave a strong ad-
dress to a good sized crowd in
the court room. Mr. Stillman is
an able, progressive and practi-
man and gave a very interesting
discussion of the principles of
good government and the issues
of this campaign. His slogan is
"Conscience and Intelligence in
Politics" and we think that it is
about time when we should have
this, and Mr. Stillman certainly
is a man that is capable of ful-
filling the duties of congressman
if elected, with the assurance of
support from some of the most
prominent men in the district
and the campaign that will be
put out. We expect to see Mr.
Stillman occupying a seat in Con-
gress this fall.

State Secretary E. E. Taylor
was at the convention in the af-
ternoon and gave an excellent
address on the organization of
our state, district and county

After convention had adjourned
the Dallas prohibitionists
met and organized an "Out to
Win" prohibition club and elect-
ed temporary officers: Presi-
dent, C. P. Gates; Secretary, D.
G. Rempel; Treasurer, H. H.
Dunkleberger; Reporter, A. G.
Rempel.
